#### Pioneer Dies at Garfield.

GARFIELD, Wash., Tuesday. Oct. 18.

Henry Clarence Clark, a pioneer of the Palouse country, is dead of paralysis. Mr. Clark died Saturday and was buried Sunday from the residence of William McClure. The services were conducted by Elder George F. Stivers of the Christian Church. His wife and eight children, four married and four unmarried, survive Mr. Clark.

GARFIFLD, Wash., Oct. 19.—(Special.)—Henry Clark, a pioneer of Oregon and Washington, died in Garfield of paralysis Saturday. He was born in Illinois, May 17, 1851, and crossed the plains with his parents in 1852. The family settled in the Willamette Valley, where Mr. Clark spent his boyhood days. When he became a young man he moved to Vancouver, Wash., and married Miss Elizabeth Bowman, who survives him. In 1895 Mr. Clark moved with his family to Garfield, Wash., where he had since resided. There are eight children, seven daughters and one son.
