Robert Bewley

Generation I



ROBERT BEWLEY (probably born 1623 in England) was thought to have been living in Burham, Co Kent, England when his children were born. Little is known about Robert Bewley at this time. He was married to Mary (surname unknown). The births below are all attributed to Robert and Mary Bewley of Burham, Kent Co, England. Whether they all belong to the same family is unknown at this time. Further research on Robert Bewley needs to be done to confirm that he is, indeed, the father of the John Bewley that is part of the following line.

The village of Burham lies tucked into the southern side of a range of hills called the North Downs in the English county of Kent (the county known as the "Garden of England").

The village is situated roughly half way between Rochester (8km/5miles) to the North and Maidstone (8km/5miles) to the South, and between Canterbury (48km/29miles) to the East and London (59km/35miles) to the West, in a designated Green Belt area known as the Medway Gap. It also sits astride the old Pilgrims Way, the ancient route along the Downs linking the cathedral cities of Winchester and Canterbury.

The Village of Burham currently has a population of about 1300 people, and boasts a rich history which can be traced back to Roman times.

Businesses in the village include five very popular Pubs, a Village Store & Post Office, Service Station, Bakery and a Chinese Takeaway.

Local amenities include a Village Hall, a Community Centre, a School, a Doctor's Surgery/Dispensary and two Churches [burhamvillage.com]

JOHN BEWLEY was born about 1660 in Burham, Kent, England. He died on 23 Sep 1704 in Philadelphia, Philadelphia Co, PA. He married ISABELLA [maiden name unknown] about 1680 in PA. She was born about 1656. She died after 1704.

(c1698-1755)

Generation III



GEORGE ANTHONY *I* **BEWLEY** was born about 1698 in Philadelphia, Philadelphia Co, PA. He died about 1755. He married **SARAH AYRES** in 1716 in Philadelphia, Philadelphia Co, PA. She was born about 1690 in Germany.

Notes for George Anthony Bewley:

1719: 24 Oct 1719 George Bewley of Abington Twp, PA, was a witness to the will of Andre Martin.

1725: 15 May 1725 according to the Norristown Deed Book p.159-215, Samuel Carpenter (probably Jr.) of Philadelphia and Mary, his wife, conveyed 200 acres of land to George Bewley of Abington Twp, Montgomery Co, PA, and his wife, Sarah. The 200 acres was later conveyed to their son, Nathan Bewley, on 17 Feb 1747. Samuel Carpenter's father, Samuel Sr. was said to be the "first merchant of Philadelphia, the first to engage in foreign trade at that port, and at his death in 1714 the wealthiest man in the Province of PA". He was a Quaker who came to PA from Barbados.

1747: George BEWLEY, of Abington, and Sarah, his wife, conveyed to (their son) Nathan BEWLEY 17 Feb 1747, the above 200 acres of land, in Philadelphia Co. Recorded at Norristown, in Deed Book No 159-215.

George Anthony Bewley and Sarah Ayres had the following children:

i. <u>NATHAN BEWLEY</u> was born about 1717 in Philadephia Co, PA. He died on 02 Apr 1766. He married MARY CARVER KNIGHT on 31 Aug 1737. She was born on 31 Oct 1716 in Abington, Montgomery Co, PA. She died about 1774 in Abington, Montgomery Co, PA.

John Bewley

(c1718-1799)

Generation IV



JOHN BEWLEY was born about 1718. He died about 1799. He married **ANN KIMBLE** on 29 Mar 1739 in Christ Church, Philadelphia, Philadelphia Co, PA, daughter of Anthony Kimble and Matilda Morrey. She was born about 1720.

Notes for John Bewley:

1735: "among the early settlers in Buckingham, Matilda Kimble then a widow, inherited from her brother Thomas Morrey, in 1735, 400 acres of land on the Horsham and Warrington, where he built a country house, still known as Graeme Park, and a mill. In March, 1722, he asked the council to open a road through the woods from his settlement to Horsham, and from there down to the bridge at Round Meadow run, now Willow Grove, which was laid out April 23d, confirmed the 28th of May, and surveyed by Nicholas Scull. In 1723 a road was laid out from Dyer's mill, now Dyerstown, two miles above Doylestown, down to Governor Keith's plantation, making the second link in the Easton road. (5) An effort was made in 1736 to have the course of the road changed between the Neshaminy and alms-house hill, because it ran through the middle of John Beuley's [Bewley's*] farm, but it was not successful. [THE HISTORY OF BUCKS COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, Vol 1 CHAPTER XLVIII, ROADS. from the discovery of the Delaware to the present time by W. W. H. Davis, A.M., 1876 and 1905* editions.]

Note: This land descended to her children, Anthony and William KIMBLE; and daughters Ann BEWLEY, wife of John BEWLEY; Rosa, wife of Josiah WILKINSON and Mary, wife of Charles HICKST. In addition to the 400 acres, Richard MORREY, the father of Matilda, and Humphrey MORREY, her uncle, conveyed several additional tracts to the children of Matilda KIMBLE at about the same date. The KIMBLES were the first settlers on this land, a large tract of which is still owned and occupied by Charles KIMBLE, a brother of the subject of this sketch. Humphrey MORREY, the grandfather of Matilda KIMBLE, was the first mayor of Philadelphia." [History of Bucks Co., Pa. Vol 1, by Davis.]

Known as "The Nation's Church" because of the famous Revolutionary-era leaders who worshiped here, Christ Church was founded in 1695. It was the first parish of the Church of England (Anglican) in Pennsylvania. It is also the birthplace of the American Episcopal Church.

The original church structure was a small brick and wooden structure that fit into its Quaker-dominated surroundings in the late 1600s. The current church was started in 1727, and has long been considered one of the finest Georgian structures in America. The steeple, financed by a lottery organized by Benjamin Franklin, was

the tallest structure in the colonies for 56 years.

The interior of the church is as impressive as the exterior. It includes the baptismal font from the 1300s donated by All Hallows Church London in which William Penn was baptized, a pulpit from 1769 built by Thomas Folwell and a chandelier still in use since its installation in 1740.

Those who worshiped regularly at Christ Church include George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Betsy Ross, Robert Morris, Absalom Jones, Benjamin Rush, John Penn (William Penn's grandson), Francis Hopkinson and many others.

The church today is still an active Episcopal parish and also the location of daily talks for visitors about the history of the church.



ANTHONY BEWLEY was born about 1745 in Philadelphia, Philadelphia Co, PA. He died on 16 Nov 1835 in Greene Co, TN. He married **SARAH PHILLIPS** about 1768 in Loudon Co, VA. She was born about 1747.

Notes for Anthony Bewley:

"The Bewleys were early settlers to East Tennessee when the area was still a frontier. In 1783, at the end of the Revolutionary War, Anthony Bewley obtained a grant of 100 acres in what is now East Tennessee. Anthony paid 50 shillings or 2 1/2 pounds plus an annual fee for the land. The land Anthony acquired was located at this point a "little below the Lick (Creek) running into the Nolichucky" (River). Shortly afterwards, probably in 1785, Anthony Bewley, his wife Sallie Phillips and their four children moved from Virginia to their land in East Tennessee. In 1786 Anthony decided to move his family again; this time 40 miles South of Knoxville to what is now Blount County, Tennessee, living most of the time in a fort near the Little Tennessee River. Knoxville had not been established by 1786; in that same year James White built his fort as the first settlement in what we now know as Knoxville.

On August 8, 1788, Anthony's eldest son Rev. George Bewley was killed on the Little Tennessee River in a battle with the Cherokees. After this happened the family returned to the Nolichucky River presumably to the land Anthony had acquired from the State of North Carolina. It is interesting that the land grant originally acquired by George Anthony Bewley is found under the listing Anthony in most records in 1783 and was not registered in Tennessee until 1792. By this time his son John (Rev. John G. Bewley) had acquired land in the same area. Five years later in 1797 Anthony sold his land to son John. If as the land grant registration stated Anthony paid 2 1/2 pounds plus an annual fee for the land he made a handsome profit in selling the land to his son for 100 pounds. The Rev. John G. Bewley and his wife Catherine Hunter lived on this land until his death in 1830. [Bewley Roots Newsletter Vol 7 No 4 December 1986 p174-175]

John was raised a Quaker but later changed to Methodist.

In the name of God Amen! I, John Philips of Rowan County and State of N. Carolina, being well in health and sound mind and memory thanks be to God, do make and ordain this to be my last Will and Test: In manner and form following, that is to say. I lend unto my beloved wife the use of my whole estate, both real and personal, during the time she remains single and living as hereater reserved. It is my will and desire that in case my wife should hereafter marry, then and in that case, I give and bequeath to her the sum of one hundred silver dollars and also her bed and furniture to her, her heirs and assigns forever. I give and bequeath unto my son Thomas Philips the sum of five shillings (a shilling was 17 cents in Old English money) to him his heirs and assigns forever. I give and bequeath to my son Gabriel Philips the sum of fifty shillings to him his heirs and assigns forever. I give and bequeath to my son Ezra Philips the sum of fifty shillings to him and his heirs and assigns forever. I give and bequeath to my son Jonathan Philips the sum of forty pounds currency of this State to him his heirs and assigns forever. I give and

bequeath to my son Robert Philips the sum of five pounds to him his heirs and assigns forever. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Sarah Buyley the sum of five shillings to her her heirs and assigns forever. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Ruth Spiers the sum of five shillings to her her heirs and assigns forever. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth Viny the sum of five shillings to her her heirs and assigns forever. I give and bequeath to my daughter Ann Cummis the sum of forty shillings currency of the State of her her heirs and assigns forever. I give and bequeath to my daughter Rebecca Williams the sum of forty shillings to her her heirs and assigns forever. I give and bequeath to my three sons (to wit) James, Elijah, Stephen Philips the whole of my lands to be equally divided between them in quality and quanity at the death or marriage of my wife aforesaid to them their heirs and assigns forever reserving as hereafter reserved. I give and bequeath unto my four children (to wit) Daughter, Mary Philips, James, Elijah and Stephen Philips the whole of the remainder or balance of my personal estate after the legacies above and before named being paid out by my executor hereafter named to their heirs and assigns forever at the death or marriage of my wife aforesaid reserving as hereafter reserved. It is my will and desire that either of my three sons aforesaid (to wit) James, Elijah and Stephen Philips should die before they arrive to the age of twenty-one years old without having lawful living sons that then and in case I give and bequeath their part or share of my land to the survivors to them their heirs and assigns forever. It is my will and desire that if either of my four children (to wit) my daughter Mary Philips and my three sons James, Elijah and Stephen Philips should die before they arrive to the age of twenty-one years old or marries that what I hath given them of my personal estate that then and in that case I give and bequeath their part of share to be equally divided between them as specified in this clause at the death or marriage of my wife. It is further my will and desire that my four children (to wit) Mary Philips, James, Elijah, and Stephen Philips be decently supported and schooled out of the profits of my estate which sum I reserve out of the use of my estate as before mentioned to my wife. And I hereby make and ordain my beloved wife Diannah Philips and my friend Lewis Hicks my executors of this my last will and test: In witness whereof I the said John Phillips have to this my last will and testament set my hand and seal this 8 day of November 1800.

Signed sealed and declared in the presence of us: John B. Palmer, John Hick, His John X Phillips mark [Richard Hayes Phillips, Ph.D., 4 Fisher Street, Canton, New York 13617 states "When I researched this will I found that it came from Rowan County, NC, from Will Book F, pp. 43-44. See FHL film 303,801"]

"Actually, Sarah "Sallie" Phillips wasn't born in Surry County, North Carolina. She was born in Pennsylvania or Virginia, as I am just now figuring out by constructing a timeline. There is much incorrect information on the worldwide web regarding John and Diannah Phillips and their children, and I am sorry to say that some of it is quite deliberate.

On 1 April 2005 I obtained, in person, a copy of John's will, made in Rowan County, North Carolina. I always thought it remarkable that the spellings perfectly matched those in the Bible records, and I could never make sense of the dates in those records. It turns out that the "Bible records" are fraudulent. John and Diannah's family was simply added, based upon the will, and posted online. Immediately after being tipped off about this, and about the likelihood that John Phillips (who died c. 1801, Rowan County, North Carolina) and Gabriel Phillips (who died c. 1809, Union District, Newberry County, South Carolina) were brothers, I have been finding documentation of their migration route from Bucks County, Pennsylvania to Loudoun County, Virginia and thence to North Carolina or South Carolina, or, in the case of John's son Ezra Phillips, to Greene County, Tennessee. This perfectly matches the migration route of George Anthony Bewley (who appears in the 1830 census for Greene County at age 80+). And this is why I wrote to you. While I would love to have an actual marriage record stating that Bewley married Sarah "Sallie" Phillips, daughter of John and his unidentified first wife (Diannah was only 26-45 in the 1800 census), there is no way that the two migration routes could match unless the story is correct. To my knowledge,

the Phillips and Bewley families have not been in communication about this.

This has consumed only three days of my life. The groundwork was laid years ago. I have completed a draft with 31 exhibits of actual documentation. I like to review such things before posting them, but I will make it available ion my website. BTW, if I am descended from John and Diannah, it would be through their youngest child, Stephen. My great-great-grandparents are absolutely known to be Stephen Phillips and Delilah Allred of Randolph County, North Carolina. This is from written family accounts and lengthy obituaries, corroborated by census records and cemetery records. Stephen was 52 years old in the 1850 census. I cannot find another Stephen Phillips born during this time period in North Carolina. I believe that he was raised by his brother James, in Randolph County, after the death of his father." [Richard Hayes Phillips, Ph.D., 4 Fisher Street, Canton, New York 13617 richardhayesphillips@yahoo.com]

"MAHLON BEWLEY comes to Arkansas: Rev. Mahlon Bewley, Methodist Minister came to Pope Co., AR from Virginia, then Alabama between 1826 and 1830. Arkansas, at the time was in need "regular conference members who could give full time to preaching. Most of these had to be recruited outside the state ...

Among them in these years we find ... the Bewleys (Nelson, Mahlon, Robert), from Tennessee. In the fall of 1830 Mahlon Bewley was appointed to serve the Arkansas Circuit; but he became ill (and died) during the year, and his son, Robert a local preacher, was secured to take his place. Robert is quoted as saying later: The only church in the place [Little Rock] was a log cabin belonging to the Presbyterians. It was in this house [in 1831] that the first Methodist society was organized, and worshipped for a long time." (Methodism in Arkansas, 1816-1976)

It is said that during these early years Mahlon Bewley and his sons, Nelson and Robert, pioneered Methodism in the northwestern part of Arkansas. He settled in Boiling Springs. "One of the first settlements in Pope County was the Boiling Springs community which was located about a mile west of where the city of Hector now stands. A large camp meeting was held at Boiling Springs in the early 1830's. As an outgrowth of this meeting, the first Methodist church in Pope County was established by Rev. Mahlon Bewley and his four preacher sons: John M., Robert S., George W., and Nelson R. The church was organized and a log building erected in 1832. [The church and church records burned. A brush arbor and huts were built in this area for camp meetings but were burned during the Civil War. In 1970 the cemetery had 514 unidentified graves with native stone markers but no names.]" [Courier Democrat 8/31/1988]

"Rev. Bewley is also credited with naming Boiling Springs. The name was given because the water seemed to just boil up out of the ground for no apparent reason and created a pretty good size branch. Boiling Springs is also called Boiling Springs Campground and by some simply Campground. Rev. Mahlon Bewley opened the first school in the area. The school was first held in his home and later in the church building. Teachers were Rev. Bewley, his son, Robert, and his son-in-law Benjamin Langford." [History of Pope County, Arkansas, v.1]

B. Keele to have one half of the lands in possession from this date, and six hundred dollars at my death and the death of my wife Livy Ann, and the said A. B. Keele to have all my lands and possession. Thirdly, I bequeath to my two sons for their interest in my estate, to A. B. Keele 50 acres of land and Jesse Keele, 80 acres. Fourthly. All the personal property and moneys that is left at my death and the death of my wife Livy Ann is to be equally divided amongst my daughters Elizabeth Coffman, Mary Eavin, Rachael Deriaux, Heneretta Bailey, Matilda Weams, Sibbriney Carter. Fifthly. My negro man named Archabel shall be emancipated and set at perfect liberty at our deaths. Lastly. I do hereby nominate and appoint my two sons Jesse Keele and A. B. Keele my Executors. Much of this information was "obtained from my grandmother McClure, my father's mother, during a visit to my home in Kansas City, MO in 1912, six years before her death. '

"To begin with, my grandmother's maiden name was Catharine Axley Bewley. She was the daughter of John Bewley and Catharine Hunter Bewley and was born on the Bewley home place in Green County, Tennessee, on the Nolichuckey River at the mouth of Lick Creek. She was married to Anthony Edward Ayers of Warrensburg, also of Greene County, six miles from her home. They moved to Polk Co, MO in 1837, where her husband died during the Civil War, in 1864. Later she married to John A. McClure, of Springfield, Missouri in 1866."

"...My grandmother lived a long, a useful, and an interesting life, having rounded out a hundred years, save four months and ten days, from 1818 to 1918. During this time she saw many of the great developments of this country, from the days of the ox teams to the autos and flying machines, from the spinning wheel and the hand loom to the great textile factories, employing thousands of people. In her younger days women spun the woof and warp, wove it into cloth and made the clothing for the family, all by hand. Our grandmothers cooked by the open fire, and for light they used candles or oil lamps."

"In her school days women were not taught to write, but her father desiring that she should learn the art, would as she say, `Set her a copy each day, from which she would practice while at school'."

"In her early days, Doctors resorted to `bleeding', when all else failed. Many times as a child she would show me the scars on her wrist, where the Doctor had `bled' her."

"She had her share of care, worry and hardship, being left alone with several small children, while her husband went to California to seek a fortune during the `Gold Rush of 1849'. She lost her husband during the Civil War. She lost her horses, her cattle and her grain to the soldiers, one even attempted to take her clothing from her, with his revolver thrust into her face, she clung to them, telling him he had no need for women's clothes."

"She laid two of her children to rest and sent her eldest son to war."

"There is a strain of ministers in the family. Her father, John Bewley, her brother, Anthony Bewley, one of her sons, Henry Ayres, her only daughter's husband, Van Robbins and three of their four sons, Bascom, Grant, and Kirk were ministers. All were Methodist ministers except Henry Ayres, who embraced the Baptist doctrine."

"My grandmother was very religious and as far back as I can remember, until her dying day, her Bible and her Hymn book were her very close friends."

"When I was left a motherless child, at the age of four, I made my home with her at Springfield, MO. For that reason she always had a warm feeling in her heart for me. By the time I was nine years old my father had found a new mother for me and I was returned to the old home place in Kansas."

"When she died and was laid to rest, her grandson, Rev. Bascom Robbins preached her funeral, her pallbearers were grandsons, great grandsons and one great great grandson, I being one of the grandsons who helped to lower her lifeless body to its last resting place, beside her only daughter, in the little cemetery at Colony, Kansas the home of her

granddaughter, Mrs. Sarah Johnson. Twenty miles west of my father's Kansas home." [Some of My People by W.I. Ayres]

HOUSE, 20th and 21st General Assemblies, 1833-37; representing Greene County; SENATE, 30th General Assembly, 1853-55; representing Hancock, Hawkings, and Jefferson counties; Whig. Born in Washington County on February 7, 1795; names of parents not given. Limited education, but described as a man of native ability and known for his unusual memory. Occupation: farmer and politician.

He lived in Greene County until after the death of his first wife; then removed to Jefferson County. When Hamblen County was established in 1870, his lands fell within that county. Served in the War of 1812 and in the Mexican War. He was married (1st) to Sarah G. Maroney on August 5, 1817; children-Phillip, Sam, John, Murphy, Will and Martha Bewley; and five others whose names are not known. About 1840 he was married (2nd) to Mrs. Malinda (Moore) Lyle; children-Robert LYLE, Jesse, Luther B.; and Isaac Bewley. Magistrate and chairman of Greene County Court. Political mentor of Andrew Johnson, later President of the United States. In his life he lived at Springvale, near Morristown, then Jefferson, now Hamblen County. Died at Morristown on February 16, 1867; buried in Bewley Chapel Graveyard, near Greenville, Green County. [Biographical Directory of the Tennessee General Assembly Robert M. McBride and Dan M. All of Anthony's sons were Methodist ministers except Jacob Murphy Bewley (1795-1867) who was a businessman and politician. Jacob's large farm "Solitude" was at this general location. The two-story brick house still stands today. It was often said the Jacob Bewley could go from his farm to Morristown without leaving his land.

After Jacob's death in 1867 Luther Boone Bewley inherited "Solitude" and lived there with his wife Lydia E. Wolford Bewley and their eight children.

Letter Written by Jacob M. BEWLEY to his son Samuel B. BEWLEY (Recorded as written)
SABBATH MORNING, February 1, 1847

My dear son Samuel:

Having returned from the south, of seven weeks absence, in fresh health, and three weeks rest has restored me, at least to write you, this the longest letter you perhaps ever saw, as you will think before you are done reading, if read at all. Will you? Too, one of the most singular, Well here goes.

My Great Grandfather, George BEWLEY, was born in England, married a lady from Germany. My Grandfather, John, came to America with his family, before the Revolutionary War, settled in New York.

My father, the 3rd son, emigrated to Loudon County, Virginia, a young man. Married my Mother Sallie PHILLIPS of the same county. Whose father was a Frenchman and Mother a Scotch woman. My father emigrated with two children to Henry County, Virginia. My father raised a Quaker, my mother a Baptist, from Henry County, Virginia came to Tennessee with six children, settled on Chuckey River, Greene County. From there to Blount County, Tennessee, where he resided two years, most of that time in a fort, which was finally attacked and taken by the Indians, and but few escaped the sword and scalping knife. Those who did were women and children, and to return the prisoners, my eldest brother George lost his life in a battle fought on Little Tennessee River, now in Monroe County, Tennessee, and no one could ever tell where his ashes sleep, or one to point or mark the spot he lay, to drop a tear. After this sad misfortune, my father and mother with broken and heavy hearts left Blount County where they had laid the foundation of a large fortune in land and returned to Greene County where I was born, and in short time thereafter both became members of the Methodist Church were they remained till they joined the Church Triumphant. From Greene County he moved to Washington County and there to Greene County on Little Chuckey, there remained till death.

At the age of near seventeen I found myself upon the theater of life without much of an education as to read the Scriptures or to light up my pathway or act my part in this important drama of life. Contrary to the council of my father, I left home, and at an old field school where I was taught to spell the name Aaron, to pronounce aloud big A, little a, ron, and in two short months finished my letters (for I knew not half) nor a single letter in writing, I treed the Master a cube root. Having got my diploma I set out and taught a large school in Hawkins County, and became so exceedingly popular, was elected President of a school in Greene County, in the midst of which I left and became a volunteer in the War of 1812, a private then an orderly, sergeant, wagon Master 1st Lieutenant. On my return home, a commission from the United States came for Captain at which time peace closed the war, and also my services, but to return. Seven months service where the cold damp ground was my bed and the Heavens my covering, and at so tender an age, shook this frame to its center, and to this hour pain occasionally in my side tells me I have one been in the army, and reminds me also often at my post, standing shivering in the bleak wind, and the dark cloud rising in the west, gathering thickness and blackness, which at first muttering

in the distance with great stride, summoning the laws of nature to strengthen her mighty arm, when torrent of rain mixed with hail and all driven before it the tall oak bending and breaking on every side, and thunders roaring, forked lightening blazing on every side, there I stood trembling at my post. The 4th of March 1813 I was discharged at Fort Clabon, 100 miles east of New Orleans and on foot returned home tired and worn down, but for the skill of Dr. Fore, I would, as did many others, have been consigned to my tomb.

On the 17th day of August 1817, I was married to your mother, Sarah G. MERONEY, who was born in Pendleton District, South Carolina. Whose father was the eldest son of colonel MERONEY, an old Revolutionary War soldier, born in Maryland, married Sallie GOLDS of the same place. Emigrated to South Carolina with Philip my Father in Law, William and Rachel, where he lost his wife. Rachel returned an infant to Maryland. Philip and William at school. William had become a distinguished minister of the Presbyterian church and most of South Carolina can tell of the fruits of his ministerial labor.

Philip my Father in Law was appointed Captain in the Indian War, where he fought a duel with Colonel WEBB, the unfortunate WEBB falling on the second shot, a subject never heard your Grandfather mention. Colonel MERONEY was of English extraction, his wife not known. My wife's father married Martha DAVIS, a very distinguished minister of the Baptist Church, whose name is found in Bindix History of that Church. His father came from Wales, wife unknown.

Your Grandfather emigrated to Tennessee with four children, settled in Greene county where we were married and in one year I was the father of a son, and in 21 years the father of ten sons and a daughter, four of whom are no more, the remainders as far as I know yet alive. I found my dear wife everything I could desire. A woman of firmness of purpose, of strong intellectual faculties, of a generous heart of unwavering devotion to her friends to her God and to all human good. Her benevolence was only limited by her means.

In 1833 I was in the Legislature, taking part in its deliberations, and have served seven springs in both branches, and the records of the county and State must tell of my report there. In July 1834, your mother attached herself to the Methodist Church and although raised up under Baptist influence she became a strong advocate of Methodist doctrine and a devoted Christian, and remained on till God in his providence saw fit to take that sainted woman to himself. She is gone, we all feel the loss, but on me falls the blow most severly, left with an orphan charge. Perhaps recollection is sufficient to trace the remainder of this weary and trying hour.

Having gone through the biography of your ancestry which may not be interesting to you, I shall proceed, and give you a family letter. Philip lives on a farm of \$6,000.00 in Cocke County, three miles east of Newport, on French Broad River, three children, two sons, one daughter, pretty children. Philip promises to do well. William lives at the forks of the river, Ferry Farm, had two daughters, two living, fine children. Will is destined without some misfortune to get rich. John is on the Mill farm, married Miss MURRAY, no children. Philip is tall and belongs to Pharo's stock. William small, well proportioned with a well balanced mind, no enemies, loved by all. John fine looking boy medium height, bids far to do well and esteemed by all. Creed is married to a Miss WOODS of good character and perhaps \$1,000.00 in cash, one child named Walter, as I hear. He had joined the Baptist church, still I have no hope of his doing any good. He is tall, six feet and two inches high and the people say fine looking. I differ. Murray is large, weighs 220, six feet two or three inches high, fine looking, fine mind, noble principles and beloved by all. Martha Jane is tall, pretty figure, not very handsome, yet very genteel in appearance, very much like yourself with an uncommon interest. She is still at school. Martha Elizabeth having left on account of feeble health. Those a home with me, Murph, M.E. Robert,

Luther, Isaac and Jessie. Murph will go on to the North for goods in the spring and follow selling goods for a while.

I am still where you left me, very little change in anything, except the arrival at Russelville of the Iron Horse, who makes a daily visit, and with his mighty trump and shrill scream gives timely notice of this approach at the distance of several miles. The result is a cash system instead of barter and trade is established. Land produces, labor has gone up and spur given to enterprise and industry. The connection with the Virginia Road will soon be made, and the consequences will be that those high mountains that have cut us off from the world, and left us isolated and alone will be overcome and make East Tennessee one of the most desirable portions of the world.

Myself and your Mother took a ride to my sister GREENS, all well had a pleasant trip. My sister a devoted Christian, fine interesting family, all wealthy. Mrs. WADE and her son William visited us and spent the day, she is a fine old lady and a splendid young man. We only regretted their short stay, surely Mary feels honored to have such a mother and brother. Mrs. WADE insisted that I should bring you home in Tennessee.

Many of your old school mates have died, among them Stephen ADAMS, his father also. Alexander SMITH has read law and attend the court, but I hear he is not likely to succeed. Charley lives on a very poor place, above Knoxville, very much embarassed. His daughter married WHELEY, who set out to make a fortune quick, by renting a farm, hiring hands, driving stock and the result was he lost his religion, lost his property of every description, and I may say lost his wife, as she has gone to her father and he has gone to try to preach again. Dave HARNEDS girls are married, the esldest to some fellow. She had a child in six weeks after marriage, the fellow fooled in her got offended and left, she remained a while with her father, and concluded it would not do, and took a fellow by the name of CHAPMAN from his wife, and left for parts unknown. Sall, as Dave called her, she too got it into her head to marry and ran off with one SWATSIL and is gone somewhere, also Charles SMITH's daughter married a fellow who left her, all those above mentioned your school mates not to say your sweethearts. BOLING is still in Parrotsville, no account. C. Fulton suspended or turned out of the Church, gone to Georgia has no character.

We have exceedingly cold weather Mercury stood at 19 degrees below zero at my house. 22 at Russellville, Corn sells at \$1. Wheat the same, Port \$5.00 bacon 10 cents 1lb and every thing in proportion.

I seen in a letter you addressed to Mattie your intention of practicing law. Well in this I can give no opinion, but I fear you will find it unprofitable, or at least not profitable as teaching. Have you a very discriminating mind? Can you discriminate and bring the points to bear before a jury? There is a striking difference between a political speech and arguing a case before a court and jury. Your absence from your family will cause Mary to worry and from any part that I can view it I cannot see that you will be profited. You may be mixing with the people and as you have a popular turn, bring yourself into notice and make the law a stepping stone to the Legislature at Washington, but this will bring to your family that social comfort and happiness so necessary and important with all families of taste and refinement, but not knowing I cannot give council in this important step. This 14th of the present month I shall have reached my sixty one years. How gladly would I amend a great portion of my life spent foolishly, and unprofitably, but those days are gone and so with the flood, and now that the sun of life is setting fast and but an inch of time left me, how important I should spend the rest of that time on my knees, and the Bible my constant companion. This shall be my constant prayer.

Saturday, February 7, 1847. I had intended to have transcribed the foregoing but its great length forbids the idea, and it come in all its deformity and homely drip. You perhaps can read it, I will

write you soon on the subject of politics and at some length and answer Marys also. Politics runs high in East Tennessee, reason was dethroned and mind lost the balance like the old Oak in the midst of the political tornado I stood almost solitary and alone for Buchannon with the honest conviction of my heart that I was right and tine will determine the corrections of my opinion that the American No-Nothiings, are wrong. I have no doubt especially in many respects, and as time will prove. I do wish you could let me know precisely how you stand in pecuniary matters, how much are you worth after all debts are paid, and what it consists. Could you have made a fortune in this time in speculating in land. I think so. Perhaps you are indifferent, may think different some day, at least if you have 14 children as I have had to educate and fit out in life. I have seen and conversed with many who had returned from Texas some whose stay was so brief they could form but an imperfect opinion of the country, but from what I learn you have a good country. I care not what avocation of life we must be industrious and economical. If I really thought you were making nothing more than a bare living I would advise you to leave and come home, but surely you are rich or have a comfortable living at least, which is enough.

I have written a long and rather a singular letter, and to conclude I will say although you are the father of a family of three children, and almost at the meridian of life I have the same care and anxious solicitudes for your well doing and happiness and you share as largely in my affections as when you were on my knew, and my fervent prayer is that God by his providence may smile upon you, and his mighty arm defend you and at last save Heaven where I will through grace try to meet you.

Farewell, my son and daughter, kiss your little children for me, Oh, that I could once more see you, perhaps I never may in this life. May Heaven bless you in the fervent prayer of your Father. [Donated by Frances L. Bewley; 116 East Watauga Ave; Johnson City, Tenn 37601; Dec 1981 Bewley Roots]

JOHN G. BEWLEY was born about 1771 in Loudon Co, VA. He died on 25 Sep 1830 in Lick Creek, Greene Co, TN. He married **CATHARINE HUNTER** about 1793 in Cherokee Creek, Washington Co, TN, daughter of John Hunter and Barbara Bowman. She was born on 27 Oct 1776 in Rockham Co, VA. She died on 11 Mar 1858 in Brighton, Polk Co, MO.

Notes for John G. Bewley:

Will probated 24 Jan 1831 in Greene Co, TN and his estate was divided 14 Oct 1833. His widow, in 1837, went to live with her daughter, Catherine Ayers in MO where she died 11 Mar 1858.

"John Bewley, my great-grandfather was born and lived his whole life in Tennessee. He was a farmer and a Methodist preacher. He located in the fertile valley of the Nolichuckey River at the mouth of Lick Creek, not far from the foothills of the Great Smokey Mountains, which forms the easterly boundary of Tennessee. Securing his land from one Robert Hill."

"He gave the land, furnished the labor and material and built a church so the people of his early day community would not be neglected in a spritual way. This church was built with lumber which he had provided for the family and doubtless had looked forward to the new home and the additional living space it would afford, but this sacrifice was made for the need of a church and the good of the community."

"There is a book entitled `The Crossing' by Winston Churchill, in which he describes the gorge, in the great Smokies, through which the Nolichuckey River flows, the beautiful mountain scenery, the trees, the birds and flowers and the rough and rocky road along which many of the early pioneers traveled, on their trek westward, ending by saying that Bishop Francis Asbury, the `Prophet of the Long Road,' had passed down this road many times. When I read it I said to myself `Where was Asbury going, but to John Bewley's Church, to preach and perhaps to stop at John Bewley's home. I have heard my grandmother speak of him so often. One of the Bewley boys was named Asbury, after the Bishop."

"This little church has long since crumbled to dust and the exact spot on which it stood is not known. The community is largely Baptist now, and they have a church near this same location." "John Bewley died in 1830. Three years later five Commissioners were appointed to divide the estate among his heirs, which they did on October 14, 1833. The tract on which the church was located fell to Anthony Bewley, who like his father became a Methodist preacher."

"There is a Methodist Church located three miles east of Warrensburg, Tennessee, known as `Bewley's Chapel'. The land on which it stands was deeded to the Trustees of this church in 1889 by Phillip M. Bewley, who was a Methodist preacher." "The Nolichuckey River on which John Bewley lived, speeds its way northward through a deep rocky gorge in the Great Smokey Mountains then bends westward running through this fertile valley to meet the French Broad River, near the westerly corner of Green County, near the Bewley Place. I have often heard my grandmother tell of the caravans and droves of stock traveling this river road, which passed her home, and how many of these travelers became angry and complained because someone was not kept constantly at the roadside with fresh water, to quench the thirst of these weary travelers." [Some of My People by W.I. Ayres]

JOHN WILLIAM BEWLEY

John William BEWLEY was born 05 Apr 1799 in Cherokee Creek, Washington County, Tennessee to Rev. John G.Bewley, a native of Tennessee and aMethodist minister and Catharine Hunter, daughter of John Hunter and Barbara Bowman. On 23 Apr 1823 in Washington County, Tennessee he married Catharine Ellis, daughter of James Ellis and Esther Thompson. After the death of John's father in 1830 he stayed in Tennessee for several years. In 1836 he removed to Lafayette, Indiana and by 1840 was residing in Deepwater, VanBuren County (renamed Cass County in 1849), Missouri. John William Bewley left for Oregon in May of 1847 leading a party of family and friends that included the James B. Graves family and William Chapman, who was traveling alone.

Nearing the end of the journey, John BEWLEY stopped at the mission to seek medical attention for his son, Crockett and daughter, Lorinda, who were both ill. Leaving the two at the mission the rest of the family continued on towards the Willamette Valley with the promised that Dr. Whitman would accompany the two left behind to the valley in the spring. Shortly after that the Whitmans were murdered in what became known as the Whitman Massacre. Crockett was killed and Lorinda was taken captive.

After learning of the death of his son and the capture of his daughter in the Whitman Massacre, he suffered an apparent heart attack and died. He was buried on the trail at the base of the Cascades.

The next year several of the older boys went back to find his grave but were unable to do so. His widow Catharine and the remaining children continued on to Oregon City where she stayed and ran a boarding house for a time. She later married Colonel James B. GRAVES whose wife had been ill on the trail and who died later after their arrival. Their combined families settled in the Sheridan area in what is now Yamhill County.

Several of the Bewley children married into the Graves family. Esther Lorinda Bewley, the oldest daughter of John and Catharine (Ellis) Bewley married William Chapman. The following is the history of their lives in Oregon.

Note: some sources list John William Bewley's birthday as 26 Apr 1799 but according to the family record of his daughter, Esther Lorinda Bewley, he was born 05 Apr 1799

"COL. JAMES B. GRAVES. Among the Oregon pioneers of 1847 the name of Col. James B. Graves is worthy of prominent mention. His ability for public service was soon recognized, and his valuable assistance as a member of the territorial legislature gained him great prominence. He was born in Virginia in 1796, and came of English ancestry. The family was established in America by Thomas Graves, the father of James B., who came to the land of the oppressed in time to assist in making it the land of the free. He settled in Virginia, and in time owned large landed estates, his enlistment in the Revolutionary war covering many of the important battles of that memorable time. From Virginia he removed to Kentucky, and from tliere to Warren county, Mo.

Before the removal of the family to Missouri James B. Graves married Diana Newton, a native of Kentucky, and she became the mother of nine children. In Missouri Mr. Graves was a member of the state militia, for meritorious seivice in which he gained the rank of colonel. Discontent in the middle west led to plans for removal to the far northwest, and in 1846 the oldest son and daughter joined a train across the plains, the father, mother and five children following the next year. After spending two months in the vicinity of what is now McMinnville, the father took up a donation claim, which has since been in the possession of the family, and which is located one mile west of Sheridan. As may be imagined, no country possessed fewer signs of civilization than did this very region around Sheridan, for in the territory there was scarcely an aggregation of houses and interests worthy the name of town. Portland was in its infancy, and Oregon City owed its signs of life solely to the fact that it was the principal distributing point for the arriving emigrants. On his square mile of beautiful and fertile land Colonel Graves built the log cabin which was the home of the family for several years, and here the first

wife died in March1848. His second marriage also occurred here, and united him with Mrs. Catherine Bewley, who died in 1867.

In 1862 Mr. Graves purchased a home in Salem, but from 1867 until his death, in 1882, at the age of eighty-five, he lived with his children. He was a man whom all delighted to honor, and his sterling integrity and interesting, personality pervaded whatever he started out to accomplish. At one time he took much interest in politics, and his services in the early territorial legislature were characterized by marked ability and disinterested devotion to the best welfare of his district." [Portrait and Biographical Record of the Willamette Valley p.262]

"Crockett Bewley and Amos Sales were still bedridden but alive. They had been so sick on the day of the attack that they both lay helpless. Crockett Bewley lay in another part of the house, not able to help himself. During that day or next, his sister went over and got him. The men remained unmolested. Thirteen of the 72 individuals at the mission were killed that first day.........

Crockett Bewley and Amos Sales, who had been very sick at the time of the original massacre, were finally recovered enough to be able to sit up part of the time. The Indians told them they must take Indian wives and live among the Indians. Bewley made no reply to these things; but Sales, who hated them bitterly, would swear at them and say he would do no such thing; that he was going below to the valley when he got well.

On the 13th of December the Indians came in large numbers accompanied by numerous young Indian women. The women would go into the room where the young men lay and look at them and talk among themselves. Bewley slept soundly all morning and his sister went at various times to see him, but always found him asleep. Sales remarked to her at one time he could not see how Crockett could sleep so; for his part he thought the Indians intended to do some mischief.

In the afternoon the Indians, led by Edward Tilaukait, gathered around the bed. It is said they were there to taunt them. If the two of them had remained silent they might have lived. However, it is reported that upon hearing of the treatment of his sister, Lorinda, Crockett Bewley confronted the captors and he and Sales taunted the Cayuse with dire prohecies of what would happen to them when their deeds were found out by the Americans. Edward suddenly struck them across the face with his riding quirt. Then he stepped aside while other Cayuse hauled them from their sick beds. The Indians tore away bed supports for weapons and used them and hatchets to beat them to death. They were dragged outdoors and their beds ransacked for their clothes, which the murderers appropriated for themselves."

"Crossed the plains in 1847--Crossing the plains is a very trying and tedious journey with ox teams, expecially with those who have large families to look after. In our company there were alot of us young folks and the first part of the road we had nice horses to ride and plenty to eat, and we thought going to Oregon was nothing but fun [.] but when we got in the Indians country and they began to run off the stock, [and] would come and demand us to give them provisions and clothes. They would come riding around our wagons all painted with those bows and arrows and tomahawks, looking as tho they would just as leave kill us as not. The men had to stand and guard every night and then sometimes the Indians would get a horse or team. My father started with five nice horses. There were six girls in our camp that use to ride horse back and one day there was a company that came up behind up and there were several young men that seen us and one of them said that he would pick out his girl, tho he had never seen her face, and that was the one that road the big gray horse and that was your grandad, but before we got to Dr. Whitman's our horses were all gone and we tried to go on foot a good deal of the time and that..... [this stops in mid sentence and remainder is missing except for entry below.]

May 10, 1847--John W. BEWLEY started across the plains to Oregon with his family and company. We had many trials a privations on the trail but landed at Dr. Whitman's Mission Oct. 10th without the loss of any of the family. We stopped there two weeks to rest and recruit our teams. In this time Mrs. Whitman prevailed on me to stay with her until the next spring. She said it was late in the season and my health was not good so I consented to stay. My mother thought it would be for the best. Then my oldest brother Crockett stayed to come down with me

next spring. We were getting along fine until the 27th of November when the Indians came in and killed the Doctor and his wife and twelve others and took the rest of us prisoners. My brother Crockett was murdered and I was taken to Umatilla to be an Indian chief's wife. Some of the time I was permitted to stay at the Catholic priests house. The rest of the time at the Indians lodge. For three long weeks I had to stay there. Every day seemed to me a week. When Mr. OGDEN, one of the principals of Hudson Bay Company at Vancouver, came and bought us from the Indians they did not want to give us up but after a few days consultation they said we might go." [Excerpts from the diary of Esther Lorinda BEWLEY just as they were written. Brackets are inserted to help with readability. I believe this was a reminiscence written in later years for her grandchildren based on a reference to their grandad which I believe was a reference to William Chapman. The writing is hard to read and decipher.]

"Editor's note: Through a curious coincidence these historical sketches of Oregon chanced to reach The Journal together. Each supplements the other:

PASCO,Mary 24--Esther Lorinda Bewley's Book present by Narcissa Whitman October the 23, 1847. This is the inscription found on the cover of a little worn leather-bound bible now owned by Mrs. Edson SAVAGE of Pasco. It was the property of Esther Lorinda BEWLEY CHAPMAN, Mrs. Savage's mother. It has seen hard wear, for the first five chapters of Genesis and a part of the following chapter are missing, also everything following 2d Timothy, third chapter and eleventh verse.

On May 10, 1847, John W. BEWLEY with his family began the long journey across the plains from Missouri to Willamette Falls in the Oregon country. After they reached the Indian country things became exciting. Braves with bows and arrows and fierce-looking tomahawks would frequently surround them and demand clothing andfood. Though a nightly watch was kept, the travelers from time to time lost horses and other stock. When they reached the Whitman Mission on the Walla Walla they gladly yielded to the persuasions of Dr. Marcus WHITMAN and his wife, Narcissa, to rest.

When the BEWLEYs resumed their journey to Willamette Falls they left behind them at the mission, Esther Lorinda and her brother Crockett. The former, whose health was impaired was to receive medical attention from Dr. WHITMAN and her brother was to accompany her in the spring to the Willamette Valley. As the WHITMAN's had adopted six children it is assumed that Esther Lorinda was kept reasonably busy as assistant to the mother

On November 29, 1847, Indians massacred Marcus and Narcissa WHITMAN and their associates. Only Esther BEWLEY and the children of the mission were spared. The latter were kept under guard at the mission station while Miss BEWLEY was bound to the back of a pony and taken to Umatilla to be the wife of an Indian chief. Before starting on the journey the girl was allowed a few minutes in which to collect some articles of clothing. Passing through the house she saw the little Bible lying on a small stand and tucked it into her bundle. On the way to Umatilla the horse on which she was riding stumbled and fell, breaking one of her wrists. Through the journey and the trying weeks that followed she kept the book in her possession. At the end of three weeks, Peter Skene OGDEN of the Hudson's Bay Company station at Vancouver sent armed men with a ransom of guns and ammunition and rescued the children at the mission and then the girl captive. They were taken to Willamette Falls, where two years later Miss BEWLEY married William CHAPMAN, the culmination of a romance which began on their journey across the plains. In 1852 they settled on a donation land claim, now the site of a large portion of Sheridan, Or. A son Frank still lives on what remains of the original homestead." [Oregon Sunday Journal, May 25, 1930 Sec 1 Page 9]

"OCEANLAKE, Or. May 24-Several years ago an aged man came to the door of Mrs. H.E. WARREN, now of this place but then living in Portland, selling washing machines. Mrs. WARREN's interesting story follows: "Conversing with him for a moment it was revealed that he was an early pioneer of Oregon. When informed that my parents, who were with me came to Oregon via the ox route, he was delighted and asked to meet them.

Entering the house with that free and open hospitality which characterized our pioneer days, the conversationbecame animated with reminiscence of the days of the covered wagon and oxteam of the long, long trail to Oregon. Forgetting for a time the merits of the clothes washer he told this story: "My father's name was BEWLEY and in our house back home in the States we had often heard of Dr. WHITMAN and his wonderful Oregon. In the spring of 1847 we took the long trail. I was a boy of 9 (T.R. was 13) years of age. There were several in our family, and during the trying journey father never ecame discouraged, although progress was slow and tedious, many were sick of fever and several graves were made on the Snake river.

My oldest brother became ill with mountain fever near the Whitman Mission, and father, having an ardent desire to know the good doctor, decided to stop there and consult him about treatment for my brother. It was late in the fall and the doctor was in the valley. Mrs. Whitman informed us that he would return in about three weeks and prevailed on us to remain to see him.

The doctor prescribed rest and put the patient to bed. Mrs. Whitman needed help in her many cares with the sick children so it was arranged to leave my sister, Lucinda (Lorinda) to assist her. The good doctor promised to bring these two children with him in the spring to the Willamette Valley.

Snow had already covered the Cascade mountains, so our wagons were driven to The Dalles, where a barge made of logs was launched and our wagons placed on board, with the wagon sheets for sails and cover to protect mother and children from storms.

Watching our primitive bark drifting down the river, which was to bring to us weal or woe, I was left on the old stock trail to follow them down with the oxen, plodding along doing my best to keep up and assist in dragging the barge over the rocks and rapids. We finally reached the end of the stock trail on the Oregon side of the river, about Mitchell Point. The oxen were ferried across the river to a place below Wind mountain. Progress was slow for the oxen.

The barge stopped at a spot on Sandy river, where camp was made, waiting for a favorable wind to ferry the oxen over the river. A sail was made of the wagon sheets on the barge. Father was sitting on front of his tent, contemplating the near ending of the long trail, when suddenly the dipping of canoe paddles caught his ear. There appeared two men in a canoe who had seen the camp fire and knew it to be an immigrant fire because of size and manner of building. They drew near enough to call to him and warn him that Dr. Whitman's mission had been pillaged by the Indians.

Horror-stricken and broken, our patient father entered his tent, lay down and died. We buried him there in the sands of the Sandy river. A rescuing party came and took us to Oregon City. My brother was tomahawked as he lay ill in bed. Lucinda (sic-Lorinda) was taken captive to Umatilla. She was restored to us with the rest of the survivors more than a month after the massacre."[note: the following appears to be from a conversation between T.R. Bewley and the Warren family. Although there are obvious errors, the general substance is of interest.] [Oregon Sunday Journal, May 25, 1930 Sec 1 Page 9]

"Lorinda and Five Crows--Cayuse Tribe Chief Courted White Girl Following Massacre by Alice Wheeler Greve-

The years have touched lightly the sturdy white house in Sheridan that William CHAPMAN built on his 640 acre donation land claim in 1860. This white frame house with the suggestion of the eastern seaboard about it was not the first one on the land. The claim had already been filed upon when the keen, appraising eyes of William CHAPMAN fell upon it. Due to the practice among the Willamette Valley Indians of burning off the brush yearly to flush out the game, the land was already for the plow. The deep rich soil, the rolling acres and the proximity to water were enough to induce CHAPMAN to part with his government warrant for service in the Cayuse war and \$15 in cash to persuade the man who had filed to give up his claim.

Standing in front of the old house, proud in its new coat of paint, memory flips back the pages of Oregon history to 100 years ago-to the tragic massacre of Dr. Marcus WHITMAN and 13 others at his mission at Waiilatpu in November of 1847 and the aftermath of the Cayuse war in 1848. William CHAPMAN was born in

New York state in 1824. In the early spring of 1847 he joined a wagon train captained by John BEWLEY of Tennessee and started the westward trek to Oregon. The young man from the North soon found companionship with the captain's four sons, Crockett, John, Jim, and Rollo and was always a welcome guest at their campfire where he met the eldest daughter, Lorinda, and the two younger girls, Miranda and Melvina. Romance road the plains in those days and the serious young man soon fell in love with blond, blue eyed Lorinda BEWLEY. But stalking the wagon trains in that fateful year was another rider. Disease struck one after the other of the families with unusual fury. Measles among the children kept the mothers apprehensive, ague with its recurrent chills and fever made the journey a burden to many. For the first time a new disease seemed to lurk about the campsites and the polluted water holes. "Mountain Fever", the doctor of the train called it, but from the history of its progress medical men of today think it was typhoid. Crockett BEWLEY contracted it and as they crossed the great alkali plains Lorinda developed augue.

The Indians had always considered the wagon trains a good market for the articles they could make and for the produce of their little gardens. It was inevitable that the diseases of the white people should spread to them, and among them prove far more virulent than with the whites.

Five Crows: Meets Wagon Trains - Wants White Wife--

Chief Five Crows, of the Cayuse tribe, had learned the methods of farming from the missions at Waiilatpu and Lapwai and his trading caravans always met the trains. It was somewhere along the route, perhaps in the Blue Mountains, that he first saw Lorinda BEWLEY and fell in love with her fragile loveliness. This chief of the Cayuses was something of a problem to his old men and counselors. In vain had they urged marriage with the daughters of leading families of their own and neighboring tribes, but Five Crows was non-commital and uncooperative. Now, in the prime of his manhood he was still single.

He had heard the stories of the eastern tribes and his keen mind realized fully that the only hope of survival for the Indians was to learn the ways of civilization. This he urged upon his people. He and his brother, Young Chief, had become Christians. Five Crows a Protestant and Young Chief a Catholic. Both wore the clothes of white men, but Five Crows still clung to his long hair which fell in two black ropes across his shoulders. To Five Crows there was no inconsistency in his desire for a white wife. All his life he had seen the comely young Indian women taken as wives by the trappers and even by the officers of the Hudson's Bay Company. Without false pride he considered himself a highly eligible bachelor. He sought the family of Lorinda at once, offering many head of horses if they would look with favor upon his suit. His pride was doubtlessly stung by their curt response that white men did not sell their women.

When the BEWLEY train arrived at Dr. WHITMAN's mission in late October it was decided that both Crockett and Lorinda would remain there for the winter. Lorinda was to help Mrs. WHITMAN with the teaching of the little girls and Crockett, who was too ill to travel farther, was to be under the medical care of Dr. WHITMAN.

Then on November 29 the Indians killed Dr. and Mrs. WHITMAN and 12 men, among them Crockett BEWLEY, and held the women and girls as prisoners. Dr. WHITMAN had been the first to fall on that day, then as if on a pre-arranged signal the men in the barnyard were attacked. Mrs. WHITMAN was the only woman killed, the muddled minds of the Indians linking her in some way with the disasters that had come to them. The next day with the unburied dead still lying where they had fallen, Lorinda picked up Mrs. WHITMAN's little Bible from a mud puddle near the doorway. This was a family treasure for many years and is now part of the memorial collection at Whitman College at Walla Walla.

The days that followed were like a long nightmare to the survivors. The Indians found a length of dress material and demanded that the women make it up into shirts for them. They came across a large bag of dried peaches, a gift from Fort Vancouver earlier in the fall, and insisted that pies be baked. While still hot the Indians devoured them greedily. That night old Beardy was very ill. At dawn he routed the frightened women from their beds, accusing them of trying to poison him. A Nez Perce squaw who could understand both languages convinced Beardy that the women were innocent and that it was only his own gluttony that had caused his illness.

On Thursday following the massacre, Indian riders came and made it clear they were to take Lorinda BEWLEY back to the Umatilla to be the wife of Chief Five Crows. She pleaded with Tilaukait to allow her to stay with the other women but he would not listen. "You will be safer at the camp of the chief", he assured her. "All the Indians will be glad to protect the squaw of Five Crows but here you will become the common property of all and I cannot help you. You will do well to marry with the great chief who wants a yellow haired wife".

Lorinda: Pleads For Refuge In Religious Group--

They left Waiilatpu in the early afternoon with a cold wind blowing across the hills. The older women packed a small satchel with necessary articles and tried to offer their sympathy. Dry eyed but with her golden head bowed in grief she rode from the yard, turning as the road went around the hill for a last look at the desolate scene that had been the busy mission farm. Five Crows stood at her horses' head when the youngest priest helped her to dismount. She walked up the path of light from the open doorway where two other priests stood. These were white men, celibates, men whose lives were dedicated to the betterment of all life! What a haven this cabin among the great, dark hills seemed to her as she went slowly toward them. Right Rev. Magloire BLANCHET, the bishop of Walla Walla, held out his hands to her and led her to the open fire. Father ROUSSEAU hurried with the simple meal of bread and cold meat, adding a pot of precious tea. The girl recognized Father BROUILLET as the priest who had helped with the burial of the dead at Waiilatpu two days before.

We are but a handful of white men among a nation of savages on the warpath", said the bishop later in answer to her plea for asylum in his house. She had washed her hands and face and tidied her hair and her natural courage floweddisagreeable it is, if I can only stay here until rescuers come", she said in a low voice.

Ogden: Bargains with Chiefs for Return of Woman--

"Five Crows is a much finer character tham most", mused the bishop. "I will do what I can to reason with him and delay as long as possible. We are all caught in this trap and are helpless. But do not weep, daughter. This great trouble is not your fault". On December 19 Peter Skene OGDEN arrived at Fort Walla Walla from Vancouver with two batteaus loaded with trading goods. Runners were sent in all directions to the chief men of the tribes to be with him at the fort. With high hopes in her heart Lorinda watched Five Crows and Young Chief ride by on their way to the great meeting. There were only two men in all Oregon who would have dared take so small a force far into the heart of the enemy country for such a parley. But the great white headed eagle was not in charge at Fort Vancouver in 1847 and next to Dr. McLOUGHLIN stood OGDEN in the minds of the Indians. He was known and trusted the length of the land as the representative of the great Hudson's Bay company that had brought them wealth and security for so long. With the care of long practice he stood before them in all the splendor and gold braid he could assemble. He spoke with sharp authority and the leaders sitting in a half circle before him felt the justice of his rebukes. Tacitly recognizing the Provisional government as the law of the land he gave no promisises of what action the Americans would take. His greatest anxiety was to get the women and children away before some overt act on the part of the settlers could set off another holocaust.

He stated his desires simply. He wanted the survivors and was prepared to pay a suitable ransom. Each of the chieftains talked, and OGDEN watched the sullen face of Five Crows closely. At last the meeting was dismissed and the Indians rode homeward in dejected silence. Their wrath had been allowed to flare in one act of vicious hatred but they knew well that it was futile to attempt to stem the tide. The shadow of that one base act would lie across their paths forever.

Chapman: Wins Lorinda's Hand in Marriage Ceremony--

Back at the mission Five Crows renewed his pleas to the white girl to consider his suit. He pointed out the advantages of position and prestige that would be hers as his wife. He would build a house for her finer than any other white woman Oregon country could boast. She would have horses to ride and Indian servants to do her bidding. When these promises met with only a negative shake of her head he made the supreme renunciation and

said if she would marry him he would gladly go to the Willamette Valley to labor and live as a white man. He stood humbly at her stirrup to make his final plea and as her horse moved out to join the cavalcade going to the fort, his fingers clutched the dirt crusted hem of her skirt.

A week later Lorinda joined her family at Oregon City and grieved to learn of her father's sudden death when he learned the fate of his son and daughter at Waiilatpu. She secured a position as teacher in the little town and the resiliency of youth brought the color again to her cheeks. She saw young William CHAPMAN often as the Oregon Rifles prepared to go in pursuit of the Cayuses. In the later summer when he returned to Oregon City he found the community wild with the news of gold in California. He joined other young men going south. Lorinda taught one more year and then on October 3, 1849, she and William were married at Oregon City by Rev. William BLAINE.

Their two eldest children, John and Katherine, were born at Oregon City and it was with high hopes that they moved their household belongings over the deeply rutted road to their new home. A comfortable log house was ready for them and with true pioneer spirit Lorinda wasted no time in starting a garden, orchard and poultry yard. It is not hard to see the panorama of busy years as one talks to the two youngest of the ten children born to William and Lorinda, Mrs. Nettie BIBEE of Corvallis and Fred CHAPMAN of Salem.

"I've often heard father tell that it was necessary for him to buy railes for his first fences because the Indians had kept the land burned off so completely", said Mr. CHAPMAN as we rode along. "But that didn't last long and before many years father had to hire men to clear off the oak grubs that had volunteered".

"Mother often spoke of the terrible winter of `63, said Mrs. BIBEE. "It started to snow on December 10 and it soon lay three feet deep all over the valley. It stayed on all winter. Father had two horses and two cows that ran out of feed early in February. Mother opened her spare bed ticks and the animals ate the straw. Of course, that couldn't last long. The horses used to come to the back steps and mother fed them bread as she had plenty of flour. At last father took the horses to Red Prairie Hills south of Sheridan because the forage was better there in the timber. He spent all of his time digging out dried grass for the cows for, with a house full of little children, milk was necessary".

Mrs. BIBEE remembered her first Christmas tree. All the family went to Pleasant Hill church for the Christmas program. She received a little red coat trimmed with plaid. It was high up on the tree but from the very first she was sure that coat was going to be hers. But what a thrill when it was finally handed down and she had it in her arms! They both remembered the twice yearly plucking of the geese for the feathers and down. A stocking was put over the gooses' head so she couldn't snap at busy fingers. The geese always knew what was coming when they saw that long black stocking. Their mother raised some turkeys, too, and with her "turkey money" she bought her first silverware. The father always drove to Portland at least twice a year with a load of wheat and other produce. Then to the joy of the children he brought back loaf sugar, oranges and colorful yardage.

Mr. CHAPMAN remembered the big, block interior of the smokehouse where twelve or fifteen hogs were cured for the winter supply. There was the great lye hopper where ashes were placed to form the lye necessary for the yearly making of soft soap. All waste fats were collected throughout the year and then when the day was right the materials were assembled and the soap was made in a great black iron kettle over a fire in the yard.

Tax Receipt: Reveals \$4.39 Paid on 640 Acres of Land--

The years passed and modern inventions changed the life on the farms and in the small towns. Mr. CHAPMAN gave five acres of land for the depot of the narrow-gauge railway that connected Sheridan, Gaston, Dallas, Airlie. Fred CHAPMAN remembers rushing down to see the first train come in and then a few days later the gala day when there was an excursion and people sat on chairs on flat-cars with a striped canopy overhead. In the early 1880's a grist mill was moved to Sheridan by James MORRISON of Buell. Mr. CHAPMAN gave the right of way for the canal and the site for the mill. A dam was built on the mill creek for necessary power. This was operated for many years and the warehouse still stands.

Mrs. Helen DICKEY, granddaughter of the CHAPMANs, showed me the first tax receipt William CHAPMAN


paid on his 640 acres of land. It was for \$4.39. The date was 1853. A few changes have been made in the old house as the years have passed, but it looks much as it did 88 years ago. G. D. WOLFER is the present owner and is very proud and happy to show visitors about it.

Children: Family of Chapman Recall Early Days--

We tore out one fireplace he said. "When we dug out the old bricks of the hearth we found a 25-cent piece with a date 1852 on it". "That had belonged to me said Fred CHAPMAN excitedly. "I was about 7 years old and was heartbroken when I lost that quarter down between the bricks and couldn't get it out". Ten children were born to William and Lorinda CHAPMAN. John, the eldest, and Katherine who late married Monroe MORGAN, were born before the parents moved to Sheridan. Eusebia was the first one born in the new cabin. She became Mrs. GRAVES. She died in early womanhood, leaving two little girls who grew up almost like sisters to the younger CHAPMAN children. Lanora also married a man name MORGAN, but of another family. Mary married Edward SAVAGE and lived in Eastern Oregon. There was Frank, who lived his life on the old home place. His daughter, Helen DICKEY, still lives on a part of the original claim. Nettie married George BIBEE and lived in Portland for many years but now lives in Corvallis. Little Isabella died at the age of three. Then there was Charles and the youngest, Henry who now lives with his daughter and son in Salem. On their golden wedding anniversary, October 3, 1899 friends, children, and grandchildren gathered together to pay homage to the couple that had gone through so much of Oregon history. A month and days later Lorinda passed quietly away in the house that had been her home for years.

William CHAPMAN passed away July 23, 1911. Both are buried at the Masonic cemetery in Sheridan. (Lorinda died 6 Nov 1899). [Oregon Sunday Journal]

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This powerful image was based on the Whitman Massacre of 1847. The Whitman family had settled in Oregon in 1838 and established a mission to the Cayuse Indian tribe. The success of the mission came to a violent end when a measles outbreak killed more Indians than missionaries. Tribal leaders, like the powerful Chief Five Crows depicted here, concluded that the missionaries intended to kill the Indians. A group of Cayuse Indians attacked the mission, killing 14 adults and taking more than 40 prisoners. Couse presents the dramatic moment following the violent capture of Lorinda Bewley, a 21 year old teacher at the mission. Bound at the waist and ankles, she has turned pale from blood loss and trauma. The Chief views her intently. Art historians disagree on the meaning of this powerful stare. Is he pleased with her capture? Or does he anticipate certain retaliation? In fact, she and the rest of the prisoners were released after 30 days in exchange for blankets, tobacco and guns. Within a few years, five of the Cayuse were captured by whites and killed. Couse studied in Europe, where he mastered the type of realism you see in the brittle leaves in the left foreground, the thickened blood on Lorinda's wrist, and the soft texture of the feathers adorning the Chief's head. The Captive was displayed in Europe in 1892 at the prestigious Paris Salon's annual show.





The pioneers were assembled in the Whitman Mission and had feared an attack by Indians for some time past. On the fatal day in November, 1847, it came. Fourteen persons were killed and 53 escaped. One who escaped was Peter B. Hall, who fled to Fort Walla Walla (Wallula of the present day) and there took a canoe and started down the Columbia River. He was never heard from afterward. SHERIDAN, Or., Nov. 7.-Esther Lorinda Buwley Chapman died here yesterday morning, aged 73 years, 8 months and 18 days.

Mrs. Chapman, daughter of John M. and Catherine Eilis Dewicy, was born in Tennessee, July 19, 1836; removed with her parents to Indiana iti 1886, and from there to Missouri. May 10, 1847, with her parents, she started for Oregon by ox teams, and after enduring much suffering and privation arrived at Dr. Whitman's mission October 10, 1847. Owing to poor health and at the request of Mrs. Whitman she remained. Her brother, Crocket Bowley, stopped also, in order to accompany her to the Willamette valley the following spring. But November 19 co-curred the rising of the Cayuses, by which so many lives were lost and 53 were taken prisoners. Crocket Bewley was killed December 7, and his sister was taken to Umatilia, and was intended to be taken as a wife by one of the head chiefs, but P. S. Ogden, one of the factors of the Hudson's Bay Company, learning of the massacre, immediately started for the scene with a company of armed men, and ransomed the 53 prisoners, bringing them to Oregon City, June 10, 1848.

Wednesday, October 3, 1849, Miss Bewiey was united in marriage to William Chapman. They remained at Oregon City until May 10, 1852, when they took up a donation claim, a part of which is now covered by the city of Sheridan. Here she lived for 47 years. She joined the Methodist Episcopal church when she was 16, and for 58 years was a faithful and consistent member. She left her husband and seven children—John M., in business at Sheridan; Mrs. Catherina Morgan, of Netart's bay; Mrs. Lecnora Morgan, living with her father; Mrs. Mary Savage, of Pasco, Wash.; Frank, living on the old donation claim; Mrs. Neitle Bibes, of Sheridan, and Fred, living on the old claim. She also left 31 grandchildren and one great grandchild.


"Among the natives of Yamhill County, Oregon, who still remain within its borders, is Frank B. Chapman who was born Dec 18, 1862, near Sheridan, on the farm on which he now resides. He is the son of William CHAPMAN, who was a pioneer in this section of the country and owned the land on which Sheridan now stands. William CHAPMAN was born in Schuyler County, New York, in 1824 and crossed the plains in 1847, settling on a donation land claim of an entire section, which included the present site of Sheridan. On this claim he built a fine residence, doing the work entirely with his own hands. He was very active in the early development of Sheridan, hauled from Portland the first goods for the stores of this town, subscribed for the railroad, gave the land for the depot and was instrumental in starting the warehouse. Always a public spirited man, he supported every measure for the good of the community. He was well posted on current events and was one of the first

subscribers to the Oregonian, which he took all his life. He died on his home place in 1911, his death being deeply regretted in the community where he had long resided and to the early development of which he had greatly contributed.

Mr. CHAPMAN was married in 1849 to Miss Esther BEWLEY, who had crossed the plains in the same train with him and was taken prisoner in the Whitman massacre, in which her brother was killed. Mr. CHAPMAN, who had served in the Cayuse War, was in the party that rescued the prisoners. In 1852 Mr. and Mrs. CHAPMAN took up their abode upon his donation land claim and there spent the remainder of their lives. She died in 1899, at the age of seventy- three years, and was buried in Sheridan, where she was so well known and loved. They were the parents of ten children, namely; J.M., now residing on a part of his father's donation land claim; Catherine, the wife of J.M. MORGAN, of Ashland, Oregon; Eusebia, deceased; Nora, the wife of Marion MORGAN, residing on a part of the home place; Mary, the wife of Ed SAVAGE, of Pasco, Washington; Isabelle, deceased; Frank B., of this review; Nettie G., the wife of G. W. BIBEE, of Portland; Charles, deceased; and Fred, residing on part of the home place......." [Centennial History of Oregon 1811-1911 Vol II p 1048]



Bewley were married October 3, 1840, and in 1852 located on his donation land claim, on which he lived during the remainder of his life, and on which a great portion of the city of Sheridan is situated.



SHERIDAN, Or., Dec. 18.—(Special.)—Harrison T. Graves, a Yambill County pioneer of 1847, died suddenly at his home in Sheridan December 12 at the age of 75 years. He was born in Warren County, Missouri, and was of Revolutionary stock, his great-grandfather having come from Scotland. On September 29, 1878, he was married to Euseba Chapman, whose mother was one of the survivors of the Whitman massacre, and is survived by two daughters. Mr. Graves was one of the stockholders in the rall-road first built to Sheridan, now a part of the Southern Pacific system.



Mary Miranda Chapman Savage was born October 21, 1858, in Sheridan, Or. She is the daughter of William and Esther Lorinda Bewley Chapman. In 1880 she married Edson Savage, and two years later with her infant daughter crossed over to Gingold Bar on the Columbia River where they lived in a tent all that summer. The only living persons they saw were Indians in canoes on the river.

Mr. Savage had large herds of cattle and horses to care for, and was away from home much of the time. The Indians were a constant source of trouble, and Mrs. Savage often returned to Sheridan to spend the winters.

In 1894 they moved to Lake Station, now Mesa, Wash., and in 1895 to Pasco, where Mrs. Savage now lives. In 1930 the children of William and Esther Chapman combined in presenting to the Whitman College Museum a Bible which was given their mother in 1847 by Narcissa Whitman at Waillatpu Mission.



"James F. BEWLEY, deceased, was an Oregon pioneer of 1847, and a highly respected and enterprising citizen. He was born in Tennessee, April 9, 1828, the son of John W. and Catherine (Ellis) BEWLEY, both of whom were natives of Tennessee. Of their twelve children, five are still living. Mr. BEWLEY, the third child in the above family, removed to the Inidana, and afterward to Missouri, and finally, in 1847, the family made the long journey to this State with ox teams. They first stopped at Whitman's Mission............

In the spring of 1852, Mr. BEWLEY, our subject, took up his donation claim near Sheridan, a half section of land. The following September he was married, and he moved upon his land, occupying a small and cheap frame house. In 1860 he sold out and moved to his wife's father's donation claim, 320 acres, which he purchased and proceeded to improve and cultivate, making it a valuable piece of property. In 1882 he retired from the farm, and resided ten months at Forest Grove, and then came to McMinnville and purchased a five acre block, and erected upon it a nice residence, now in the corporate limits; it it a very picturesque location. In this pleasant home they resided, at the same time carrying on the farm untill 1888, when Mr. BEWLEY was recklessly shot by a young marshal at Sheridan. This sad event was brought about in this way: There was small-pox at McMinnville, and the place was quarantined. Mr. BEWLEY went to his farm, and stopped to see a man at Sheridan, when the officer met him and a colloquy occurred, in which Mr. BEWLEY was ordered to throw up his hands. He had no sooner done so than he was shot and killed. His son attempted to shoot the murderer, but failed. Mr. BEWLEY was in his sixtieth year. He was a successful, enterprising, and reliable citizen. In his political principles he was a Republican; was a strong supporter of U.S. Grant. September 12, 1852, is the date of Mr. BEWLEY's marriage to Miss Lucy E. GRAVES, a native of Missouri, and the daughter of Colonel GRAVES, his stepfather: The GRAVES family were also pioneers of 1847. Mr. and Mrs. BEWLEY's first son born in Oregon, was named Crocket A., to commemorate Mr. BEWLEY's brother, who was killed by the Indians. This son was born July 31, 1853, but he died while yet a boy. The second and only other child, Roswell L., was born December 24, 1864.

Mrs. BEWLEY resides at the home in McMinnville.... [Illustrated History of the State of Oregon 1893, p.884-884.]

"Worthy of ranking among the chief developers of the state of Oregon was James F. BEWLEY, a pioneer of 47 and for many years an agriculturist of Yamhill County. A native of Tennessee, Mr. BEWLEY was born April 9, 1828, the third oldest of the twelve children of John W. and Catherine (ELLIS) BEWLEY, natives also of Tennessee. From their ancestral home in Tennessee the BEWLEY family removed to Indiana, and from there to Missouri, in which the latter state they developed an ambition to go west, and, accordingly, outfitted for the dangerous and adventurous journey.....

James F. BEWLEY became an independent land owner in Oregon in the spring of 1852, when he took a half section of land near Sheridan. September 12, 1852, he married Lucy E. GRAVES, a native of Missouri, and daughter of his step-father, Colonel GRAVES. For some time afterward he lived in a rudely constructed frame house, and in 1860 disposed of his property and purchased the 320 acre farm of his father-in-law. This property was his special pride for many years, and his most intelligent and broad-minded efforts were expended in making of it a model agricultural enterprise.

Somewhat weary of arduous labor, Mr. BEWLEY took up his residence in Forest Grove, after ten months removing to McMinnville. The five acres of land purchased for his home is now within the corporate limits, and the home erected theron reflected his ideas of comfort and refinement. At the same time he managed his finely improved farm, up to the tragic event which occasioned his death in 1888. Owing to a small-pox epidemic, Sheridan was quarantined, but notwithstanding this fact, Mr. BEWLEY went to his farm and stopped to see a man at Sheridan. Being met by an officer, a colloquy followed regarding his attitude in the matter, and such proportions ded the argument assume that Mr. BEWLEY was ordered to throw up his hamds and was instantly shot. His son, who was present, was also shot at, and in turn shot at the murderer, but the ball fell short of the mark. This sad event threw disorder and sadness into the happening of McMinnville and vicinity for Mr. BEWLEY was a man most highly honored by all who knew him, and his sixty years of worthy living deserved a less ignominious termination.

In memory of the brother so ruthlessly killed by the Indians in 1847, Mr. and Mrs. BEWLEY names their first son Crocket A., and this birth occurred July 31, 1853. He died while yet a bright-eyed boy, but his brother, Roswell L., born December 24, 1864, still lives and owns the old homestead. In October, 1888, he was united in marriage with Anna R. YOUNG, a native of New York state. Mrs. BEWLEY, who afterward married J.W. COWLS, also deceased, is one of the highly-honored and popular women of McMinnville and in her interests displays broad-mindedness and capability. She is foremost in all efforts of the women of her locality to improve their social and intellectual surroundings, and is especially prominent in the Christian Church, the Ladies' Aid Society and the Woman's Relief Corps of Custer Post No. 5, G.A.R., of which latter organization she was for one term junior vice-president. [Portrait and Biographical Record of the Willamette Valley p.267-268]

"CIRCUIT COURT NOTES.--Circuit court has been in session here this week. The attendance is not large, and the docket smaL, but will probably extend into next week with some of the criminal trials. One of the most interesting cases has been that of J. F. Bewley against T. N. Graves, supervisor of Sheridan road district, for opening a road between Bewley and Chapman upon an order from the county court. Bewley was awarded. \$160 damages. The case is to beiappealed. [Oregonian April 2, 1888 p4:2]

"A Fatal Quarantine--James Bewley, A Yamhill Pioneer, Shot At Sheridan--His Son Is Also Fired Upon--And In Turn Empties His Revolver At The Slayer Of His Father--McMinnville, Or, Sent 26. James Bewley, one of the wealthiest citizens of this County, and a pioneer of 1846, was shot in the streets of Sheridan last evening about 5 o'clock by W. McCune, a young man on the Sheridan quarantine

force, and died early this morning. Bewley lives in McMinnville, and McCune notified him to leave Sheridan, as they were afraid of smallpox. While parleying about leaving or being arrested McCune drew a pistol and fired into Bewley's face. The ball entered the right cheek and lodged in the brain. Bewley fell backward out of his buggy.

McCune then turned and fired several shots at Roswell Bewley, a son of James Bewley. Roswell ran into a livery stable near by and procured his pistol and ran out firing at McCune, who ran down the street. Young Bewley pursued him some distance. Meeting McCune's father, who had undertaken to stop him by throwing stones at him, young Bewley turned on the elder McCune, but having exhausted his pistol picked up a stone and struck McCune on the forehead, knocking him down, and he remained insensible for some time.

The wildest excitement prevailed at Sheridan all night. Between the quarantine and the tragedy there was no sleep. Sheriff Harris went up during the night and arrested McCune, and he was taken before Justice Landon of Willamina precinct for examination today."[Oregonian Sep 27, 1888 p.2:1]

THE SHERIDAN HOMICIDE--Particulars of the Three Day Examination of Willard McCune-Some surprise has been expressed that the result of the preliminary examination of Willard McCune, charged with the murder of James Bewley, should have been the discharge of the prisoner. The following account of the examination will furnish the reasons for Justice Leonard's action.

The examination began Thursday and continued during Friday and Saturday A great amount of testimony was introduced, the general drift of which appeared to be that McCune was justified in killing Bewley. The story of the homicide was about the same as has been heretofore related, except as regards that which took place immediately preceding the shooting It appears that McCune had ordered Bewley to leave town. A quarrel ensued, in which the words "don't draw your revolver" uttered by McCune were clearly heard. Both then made a movement to draw their weapons, but the deputy marshal was the quicker and got his bullet home first. Bewley's pistol dropped to the ground at the same time he did. Testimony as to whether or not two shots had been fired from it was conflicting, one respectable citizen declaring that when he picked it up two shots were missing. But afterwards the weapon was found fully loaded.

It appeared on the examination that Bewley had sent word that he was going through town if he had to shoot his way through. It was also stated that during the fracas Andy Bewley, a nephew stood some distance off and fired several shots at McCune.

Old man McCune, who was hit In the back of the head with a rock thrown by Roswell Bewley, has been lying in a precarious state ever since, and was yesterday given up by his physicians.

It was stated in these columns that MeCune was bound over for murder in the first degree. The Information was obtained from a resident of Yamhill, who claimed to have positive knowledge. It is difficult to see how he could have been mistaken.

The examination of McGune was attended by almost the whole population of Sheridan. When he was discharged he was escorted home by a great crowd, who enlivened the way with noisy demonstrations of rejoicing." [Oregonian October 3, 1888 p. 3:2]

"Yesterday's Proceedings--The Testimony Turns More In McCune's Favor--McMinnville, Or, March 28--All of the front seats were taken principally by ladies half an hour before court was calle to order at 9 o'clock. The acoustics of the room are not good and speaking is unintelligible in the remote

parts. Cross examination of witnesses is slow and tedious and many of the answers unimportant.

Hiram Hurnet (?) testified that he was working for Bewley the day of the shooting and saw Bewley take a pistol with him when he started to Sheridan, a large pistol.

Henry Gee met Bewley going to his farm the day of the shooting and saw a pistol in the buggy seat by his right thigh. It looked like a Colt 8 navy(?).

Sheriff Harris brought in that ugly young arsenal of pistols again, with their long shining barrels and bullets bulging for several chambers. He had examined deceased's pistol since last evening by direction of the court and found no powder in one chamber investigated, investigated but one chamber. The gun was given him by Coleman.

G.W. Sappingfield saw deceased, Roswell and T.R. Bewley together in deceased's field on the day of the shooting.

Warren, a merchant of North Yamhill, was at Sheridan on the day of the shooting and saw deceased in a cart. Roswell and T.R. Bewley were in Bewley's livery stable about 3 o'clock. When deceased was requested to leave town by the older McCune he said I will leave town but I won't be forced out.

Roswell said there were not enough men in town to put father out.

The older McCune said we will see about it.

Apprehending trouble wives left town before the shooting.

William R (unreadable?) lived at Sheridan, met deceased at Bellevue the day of the shooting. Bewley said he was going around Sheridan. Some school children were near during the conversation.

John Bones was in Sheridan on the day of the shooting, saw the gestures and heard the shot when looking in another direction, looked around and saw McCune's pistol in line with Bewley's face, and it was immediately discharged and Bewley fell from his cart. Then McCune and Roswell exchanged two shots apiece nearly simultaneously. Then McCune fired one shot into the livery stable as there appeared to be three men firing at him from that place. Witness caught Bewley's horse. Fifteen or twenty shots were firec altogether. McCune fired a fifth shot as he ran toward his home.

Cross-examination--Was sitting near the end of the bridge and heard voices but could not distinguish the words, saw the emphatic gesutres before the shooting but saw no pistol in deceased's hands, heard Walter Graves, commanding officer of the Sheridan cavalry declare the town under martial law and demand all the arms of parties not members of his command.

Witness father having died suddenly last evening he was excused from further attendance.

D. C. Coleman, postmaster at Sheridan saw part of the difficulty and heard the wrangle. The first two pistol shots were nearly simultaneous. The third followed instantly, which witness believed was the fatal shot, when Bewley fell from the cart. Witness thinks Bewley and McCune fired the first two shots. He picked up Bewley's pistol (unreadable?), where it fell by him, two caps were missing from the (unreadable?), he thought that two chambers of Bewley's pistol had been discharged. Walter Graves delivered four more pistols to witness for safe keeping and he delivered the pistols to the sheriff. T.R. Bewley examined the pistol at the time of the handing to the sheriff who called witness attention to the fact that all the chambers of deceased's pistol contained bullets.

Cross-examination--He helped carry Bewley to Dr. Smith's office, thinks pistol was underneath deceased's person when he fell in the street.

Ida Kingsbury 11 years old lived near Bellevue was going to school and heard Raleigh tell Bewley that he couldn't go through. Bewley said "I'll shoot my way through!" Witness was cross examined at length with no material change.

The spectators spent but a few minutes away at noon and returned with food in their hands still eating. The crowd seems to increase.

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[This sentence too faded to be readable.]

Anson Munser was working with Bewley on Bewley's place near Sheridan. Deceased, Roswell and T.R. Bewley met at Bewley's place the day of the shooting. Roswell advised his father not to go through Sheridan, deceased said he would go through if he had to shoot his way through. T.R. Bewley said I'll see you through, they started. Witness and Roswell putting horses in the barn, (?) harnessed, saddled others and followed at once. Witness stopped by field but Roswell followed on at a gallop.

Edward Deacon 13 heard the (?) Bewley added If you touch me I will kill you and made a motion to draw a pistol when McCune drew a pistol and fired first. McCune was on guard below town and said he was going home to get supper. Witness went to town with him, saw a pistol in Roswell's pocket just before the shooting began.

Sam Evans testified that deceased told the elder McCune that there were not enough men in town to put him out, saw deceased make a move to draw a pistol as McCune drew his pistol and fired. Other testimony was corroborative of Bones and Coleman. After McCune went home and got a large pistol he was returning to the scene of the difficulty with a belt containing several cartridges and was arrested and disarmed by the Sheridan militia.

The remainer of the afternoon was consumed in the examination of witnesses most of the time being consumed by the prosecution. The testimony was chiefly corroborative and cumulative. The crowd was frequently pressed back by the baliffs.

Willard McCune will go on the stand and tell his own story at 7. Court adjourned at 6 for one hour. [Oregonian Mar 29, 1889 p.3]

"The acquittal of McCune at. McMinnville is the conclusion of a very sad and stupid bit of business. The first act in this stupid drama was the ignorant panic of the people of Sheridan over the smallpox—a disease that does not compare in destructiveness with diphtheria that annually scourges the country from Maine to Oregon. The next stupid thing was the absurd and illegal action of declaring the town "under quarantine" and appointing a young, ignorant; inexperienced fellow; likeMcCune as part of the military police. If the town resolved to have a police and to clothe it with peremptory powers of arrest and exclusion, nobody but men of maturity and reputation for common, sense and cool, discreet temper should have been allowed a place upon it.

Bewley was intelligent enough to know that these proceedings of the hamlet of Sheridan had no legality, and being an old pioneer and a pugnacious man,' he was. not disposed to yield without protest against the absurd action of the authorities of Sheridan. There was no evidence that Bewley had drawn a pistol, although he was armed, as too many are in this country: but if Bewley had drawn his pistol, made a fight, and in resisting arrest had killed McCune, it is quite likely he would have escaped punishment, for McCune had 'no legal authority to exclude Bewley from Sheridan or to arrest him. What saved McCune was the rough border justice which says that the man who carries a sword shall perish by thesword. Bewley carried a pistol, and was a pugnacious old pioneer, and while we do not believe that Bewley ever intended to use his pistol, except in self-defense, still McCune, knowing his reputation as a combative man who usually carried a "gun", could make a plausible defense for killing him. The young man is not half so responsible for his folly as his town, that clothed the young fellow with his illegal

powers of life and death; and yet this young man will always carry with him when he is older in painful memory of having robbed a fellow creature of his life, an excellent woman of her husband and the community of a man who, though passionate, was in the main a good and valuable citizen. Bewley would be alive to-day; McCune would be free from what will always be a painful memory for a decent man to recall, if the authorities of Sheridan had not acted like terror-stricken fools in the start. It was their business to have found out what their powers were under the law, and not exceeded them; and next it was their business to appoint no boys on their police force, clothed with powers of life and death.

A cool, middle-aged man in McCune's place would have had no serious difficulty with Bewley, who was not a man with the reputation of a ruffian or a desperado. The original smallpox panic was absurd; the placing of Sheridan under martial law was illegal, and the appointment of a youug'inexperienced man to a place on this "military police" was most thoughtless and unfortunate. Towns ought to find out what their rightful powers are, and execute them through men of discretion. [Oregonian April 2, 1889 p. 2:2]

"Of course young McCune, who killed James Bewley, goes free. To kill a man is no crlme if he happens to speak independently to some one. While no one supposes that the young man wanted to kill Bewley or intended to do so, yet he did so and the consequences are known to the world. Guns and pistols were not necessary for the protection of the place, and the fact that a man was set to guard a highway did not empower him to kill everybody that passed that way. The killing of Bewley was the logical outcome of the wild scare created over the smallpox terror. Excitement feeds off such fears, and become demonized, pistols are drawn and good citizens are killed." [Oregonian April 4, 1889 p.4:2]

Mrs. R. L. Bewley, 74, who tripped over a chair in her home at 2305 Southeast Yamhill street on May 15, died last night in St. Vincent's hospital. She suffered a left hip fracture at the time of the fall, the hospital reported.

"Rosewell L. BEWLEY. While his mother was on a visit to Salem, Marion County, Ore., Roswell L. BEWLEY was born, December 24, 1864, and he was afterward reared on his father's farm, one and a half miles from Sheridan. Judging by his present success, he must have had an excellent agricultural training, his educational chances being also far above those of the average farm-reared youth, for he was permitted the advantages of the public schools, the Forest Grove College, and the McMinnville College.

Mr. BEWLEY assumed charge of one of the finest ranches in this county in 1888, and on October 7, 1888, married Anna R. YOUNG, who was born in New York state, and who has borne him twin boys, William H. and James Garfield. At the present time Mr. BEWLEY owns five thousand acres of land, nearly all in one body, of which one thousand acres are devoted to farming enterprises, and all under cultivation. Also, he owns a stock ranch of eight hundred acres in Polk County, and has some of the finest stock in the state. He is one of the most experienced and influential stockmen in Oregon, and one of the largest land owners.

Mr. BEWLEY is a Republican in politics, and is fraternally connected with Sheridan Lodge No. 64, F. & A.M., of which he is past master." [Portrait and Biographical Record, p. 268] Note: He remained on the old McMinnville homestead.

"Man, Wife Died In Apartment House Shooting--A 54-yer-old Oregon shipyard guard and his wife were found dead in their apartment at 914 NW 20th avenue shortly after 11 a.m. today, both with bullets through their heads.

City detectives were called to their second floor flat by Mrs Mabel Reyburn, apartment manager, who said she knocked at their door this morning because she had heard nothing of the couple since early Wednesday evening.

When she opened the door, she found Harry William Bewley wearing a dark overcoat, slumped half way on a chair and half way on the floor. A .32 special revolver was lying under him. His wife, Rose, wearing overcoat, gloves and a hat, was lying on the davenport. A scenic picture, torn from the wall, lay smashed on the floor.

Detectives learned that no one had heard shots and time of death could not immediately be determined

by the coroner `because the heat from the furnace would keep the bodies warmer than normal'. Two bullets were gone from the gun, detectives said.

Inspector Leon V. Jenkins said that Bewley was formerly of McMinnville and a bank book on that city's bank found on his person bore out his statement. It showed a deposit of \$1000 on February 17, and a previous deposit of \$500.

Many empty beer and whiskey bottles were found in the kitchenette.

Police said evidence indicated that Bewley had shot Mrs. Bewley, who was reported to be his second wife, and then turned the gun on himself. They are continuing their investigation.

Autopsies will be performed, the cornoner said.

Although police personnel files were not available since the chief clerk's office was closed for Washington's birthday, it is believed that Bewley was with the force from 1911 to 1913, having left in 1914, reportedly with a good record. At the time he joined the force he was 21. Following his service with the city police he was employed as a car salesman and since the war had been employed at Oregon ship. While in the police force he was a member of the police band." [Oregon Journal, Feb 22, 1945 p.1]

"Wife Slayer Ends Own Life--Harry William Bewley, 54, former Portland policeman and recent heir to a fortune, was dead Thursday in an apparent murder and suicide which also took the life of Mrs. Rose Evelyn Bewley, 37, his third wife.

Bodies of the couple were found shortly before noon by Mabel E. Reyburn, manager of the apartment house at 914 N.W. 20th avenue, where the Bewleys occupied one room. Both were fully clothed, including outer coats, indicating they were preparing to leave the apartment at the time of the double tragedy.

The body of Mrs. Bewley lay on a davenport and that of the man lay partly on the floor and partly on a plush armchair. There was a bullet hole in the head of each, and a .32 caliber revolver lay under the body of the man.

There was no note left in explanation of the apparent murder and suicide, but numerous wine bottles were found in the apartment, and police theorized that the shooting climaxed a quarrel between the two." [Oregonian Feb 23, 1945 p.1:5]

"Murder Times Still Mystery--Police Inquiry Points to Hours--The time of the apparent murder and suicide which took the life of Harry W. Bewley, 54, and his wife, Mrs. Rose E. Bewley, 37, could not be definitely established, but investigation indicated that it occurred between noon and 8 P.M. Wednesday.

Mrs. Bewley made a call to a relative at McMinnville at about noon of that day, said The Oregonian's correspondent at McMinnville, announcing she and her husband planned to arrive there `in about two hours.'

Telephone Unanswered--At 8 P.M. Mabel E. Reyburn, the apartment house manager, tried to call Mrs. Bewley to the telephone, which is located in a downstair hall, and received no answer when she knocked on the door. The manager said the couple did not leave the apartment all day Wednesday. Other tenants on the floor where the Bewleys lived were out of town, it was said, and no one heard the shots.

Bewley, who was formerly a guard at Oregon Shipbuilding corporation, was a son of Roswell Lamson Bewley, wealthy McMinnville banker, who died last February 2 at the age of 80 years. The elder Bewley was formerly a principal stockholder in the McMinnville National bank, which is now a branch of the United States National bank.

Appraisal Pending--The stated value of the estate left by the veteran banker is \$125,000, but it was said the estate has not yet been fully appraised, it consists of 620 acres of land lying three miles west of McMinnville and a quantity of stocks and bonds. The only heirs mentioned in the Bewley will were Mrs. Margaret Rummel, Chicago a granddaughter who received \$500 and Harry Bewley who received the

remainder.

Old-timers in the Portland police bureau recalled Thursday that Bewley and his twin brother, James Bewley, joined the bureau in 1911 and were dismissed in 1914 when it was learned they had falsified their ages in their application.

Harry played a trombone in the old police band, which was disbanded at about the time of World War I. James died about seven years ago at Wheeler, Or.

Inspector L.V. Jenkins said he had one of the brothers on a wagon and the other on a beat, and that they would take advantage of their resemblance to work each other's jobs.

Bewley was said to have been born in Portland." [Oregonian Feb 23, 1945 p.7:2]

"Police Ponder New Phone Tips In Two Deaths--Dectectives are investigating possible further developments in the apparent murder-suicide of ex-policeman Harry W. Bewley, 54, and his third wife, Rose Evelyn Bewley, found dead in their apartment Thursday, after receiving persistent calls Friday from a man identifying himself as Fay L. Allen, 57, of 627 SW 15th avenue, who insisted that he had information about the deaths of the two.

Following calls received from Allen by Detective Captain Keegan, the coroner and city detectives, the latter finally arranged for him to consult the district attorney at 3 p.m. and Detectives McMeeken and Nelson were on their way to pick him up, when they received a riot call from apartment No. 6 at 627 SW 15th avenue, and discovered that Allen loudly claiming that he `loved Rose', and that both the Bewleys had been murdered.

Allen, who was drunk, also declared that someone had tried to murder them before at McMinnville by giving them poisoned liquor and that Rose had been in the hospital there as a result of the incident.

Allan's landlady told detectives that a woman answering Rose Bewley's description had been visiting him at his apartment for the past two months and that Allan had lived in the apartment for about two months. Detectives lodged him on a drunkeness charge until he would be able to speak coherently." [Oregon Journal, Feb 24, 1945 p.2]





SHERIDAN, Or., Jan. 29.—
(Special.)—Mrs. Miranda Narcissus Graves, a member of a ploneer family who came to Oregon by oxteam from Indiana in 1847, died at her home here on January 23 at the age of \$4 years. While the family was on its way to Oregon the members were caught in the Whitman massacre and a brother, Crockett Bewley, fell a victim to the Indians November 29. 1847, while a sister, Lorinda Bewley, was kept a prisoner until rescued by settlers. Mrs. Graves left a few hours before the massacre.

She was married to Thomas N. Graves at Oregon City, September 14, 1852. They located on a farm near Sheridan, where she has since continuously resided. She is survived by 11 children.



SHERIDAN, Or., Nov. 17.—Thomas Newton Graves, a pioneer of 1847, died at his home near Sheridan early yesterday morning. Mr. Graves was born in Warren county, Missouri, in 1831. He came to Oregon with his father, James B. Graves, in 1847, and settled upon the place, where he resided ever since. He was married to Miss Miranda N. Bewley in 1852. They had 11 children, all of whom, together with the widow, survive him — Henry H., Eugene M., Charles, Walter G., Edward R., Laura C., Nellie E., Louis J., Christina M., Wilbur and Bertha Graves. Charles Graves resides in Washington, and Nellie E. Graves in Michigan. For over 50 years Mr. Graves was a prominent and familiar figure in the history of Yamhili county. He took a strong interest in political matters, and was always identified with the republican party. He was county commissioner from 1870 to 1803, and almost continually represented his precinct at the county conventions and his county at state or district conventions.

"Sheridan Pioneer Succumbs At 91; Services Held--Sheridan, June 20--Funeral services for Dr. Eugene Milton Graves, son of one of Sheridan's pioneer couples, were held here Wednesday, June 12, in the Methodist church with Rev. Harvey DeVries officiating at two p.m.

Dr. Graves, son of Thomas N. and Mirandy Bewley Graves, was born Jan. 18, 1855, in a log cabin two miles southeast of Sheridan. He was the second of 11 children.

He attended Willamette university and California State Normal school at San Jose, and was then a letter carrier in Portland and Lincoln, Neb.

He also graduated from a four year dental course at the university of Michigan. He practiced in Portland and later in Sheridan, retiring after a few years.

On Jan. 28, when he became ill he went to live with his sister, Mrs. Christina Bogue, but was confined to his bed until his death.

Surviving are his brother, Wilbur T. Graves of Vernonia and two sisters: Mrs. Nellie Chapman of Sparta, Mich.; and Mrs. Bogue of Sheridan. He was 91 years of age.

Physicians yesterday announced the probable recovery of Mrs. Laura Whitmer, who was accidentally shot by her son on Tuesday night at their home on Taylor's Ferry road. She rested well yesterday at Good Samaritan Hospital.

Dear Comrade, the blanks you sent me went to Sheridan and was delayed there until a few days ago. I have moved in a neighborhood where they is no R.F.D. near. Enclose please find one blank filled by myself. As witnesses, I named T.N. Faulconer and J.T. Lady, as they were both in the same Co with me. I have sent the rest of the blanks to T.N. Faulconer at Sheridan, for him to fill out, as the members of Sheridan camp is there. Yours truly, T.R. Bewley"

Note: the following article appears to have to refer to Theophilus but he died in 1920 so it would have been more than a few years since the incident in question.

"Oceanlake, Or. May 24-Several years ago an aged man came to the door of Mrs. H.E. Warren, now of this place but then living in Portland, selling washing machines. Mrs. Warren's interesting story follows:

Conversing with him for a moment it was revealed that he was an early pioneer of Oregon. When informed that my parents, who were with me came to Oregon via the ox route, he was delighted and asked to meet them. Entering the house with that free and open hospitality which characterized our pioneer days, the conversation became animated with reminiscence of the days of the covered wagon and oxteam of the long, long trail to Oregon. Forgetting for a time the merits of the clothes washer he told this story:

My father's name was Bewley and in our house back home in the States we had often heard of Dr. Whitman and his wonderful Oregon. In the spring of 1847 we took the long trail. I was a boy of 9 (T.R. was 13) years of age. There were several in our family, and during the trying journey father never became discouraged, although progress was slow and tedious, many were sick of fever and several graves were made on the Snake river.

My oldest brother became ill with mountain fever near the Whitman Mission, and father, having an ardent desire to know the good doctor, decided to stop there and consult him about treatment for my brother. It was late in the fall and the doctor was in the valley. Mrs. Whitman informed us that he would return in about three weeks and prevailed on us to remain to see him.

The doctor prescribed rest and put the patient to bed. Mrs. Whitman needed help in her many cares with the sick children so it was arranged to leave my sister, Lucinda (sic) to assist her. The good doctor promised to bring these two children with him in the spring to the Willamette Valley.

Snow had already covered the Cascade mountains, so our wagons were driven to The Dalles, where a barge made of logs was launched and our wagons placed on board, with the wagon sheets for sails and cover to protect mother and children from storms.

Watching our primitive bark drifting down the river, which was to bring to us weal or woe, I was left on the old stock trail to follow them down with the oxen, plodding along doing my best to keep up and assist in dragging the barge over the rocks and rapids. We finally reached the end of the stock trail on the Oregon side of the river, about Mitchell Point. The oxen were ferried across the river to a place below Wind mountain. Progress was slow for the oxen.

The barge stopped at a spot on Sandy river, where camp was made, waiting for a favorable wind to ferry the oxen over the river. A sail was made of the wagon sheets on the barge. Father was sitting on front of his tent, contemplating the near ending of the long trail, when suddenly the dipping of canoe paddles caught his ear. There appeared two men in a canoe who had seen the camp fire and knew it to be an immigrant fire because of size and manner of building. They drew near enough to call to him and warn him that Dr. Whitman's mission had been pillaged by the Indians.

Horror-stricken and broken, our patient father entered his tent, lay down and died. We buried him there in the sands of the Sandy river. A rescuing party came and took us to Oregon City. My brother was tomahawked as he lay ill in bed. Lucinda (sic) was taken captive to Umatilla. She was restored to us with the rest of the survivors more than a month after the massacre." [Oregon Sunday Journal, May 25, 1930 Sec 1 Page 9]

It is expected that members of the company organized in this County, as well as all who are entitled to become members and also their friends will be present and contribute toward having a good time. It will not only be the complete and perfect organization of the company, but a reunion of the old pioneers who constructed the roadways of civilization on this coast. We honor these people and will do all we can to make this meeting a happy one. Communication upon this subject should be addressed to Burt Brockway, orderly sargeant at this place.

The Indian war veterans, of Sheridan, says the Polk County *Itemizer*, have organized a camp, to be called Sheridan Camp, with the following officers: T. R. Bewley, captain; Wm. Chapman, first lieutenant; I. N. Faulconer, second lieutenant; H. B. Somervllle, orderly .sergeant; E. T. Branson, com. sergeant; A Houston, color sergeant; T. J.l Lady, musician; J. In the application he stated he was b. TN, was 5'10", light complextion, blue eyes, white hair, was able to read and write, was a farmer, was a widower. He had enlisted in the Yakima Indian War on Jan 27, 1856 at Lafayette, OR. He was a Pvt in Co C, 1st Oregon Mtd Vols. He was discharged from service June 5, 1856 in Portland, OR.

His pension was stated as being both \$16.00 and \$20.00 per month, Pension #5867. His application was signed by J.A. Bewley (son), Independence, OR. T.R. listed his parents as John W. Bewley (TN) and Catharine Ellis (TN).

An affidavit was signed on July 1, 1914 by B.C. Agee and S.E. Agee attesting to the fact that he was who he claimed to be. The reason for admittance was for treatment of a hernia. It is stated that he last was in the hospital on April 02, 1867 (year hard to read, it is written over). Was admitted per request.

"Bewley, T.R.-- Born in East Tennessee in 1834; moved to Indiana in 1836. Settled first at Oregon City. Lives now at Sheridan, Yamhill County; occupation, farming and stock-raising. Married Elizabeth E. Patty, in September, 1859. The lady is a native of East Tennesse, and was born September 8, 1841." (History of the Willamette Valley, 1885, H.O. Lang p.664)


"Theophilus Rollins Bewley (also known as "Rollo" and "T.R.") was born in Tennessee to John and Catherine BEWLEY. He lived in Tennessee until 1834 when he moved with the family to Missouri. In 1836 his family moved to Indiana and then on to Oregon in 1847. After many hardships on the trail including the death of his brother, Crockett, at the Whitman Massacre and the death of his father on the trail, he and the remaining members of the family reached Oregon City in December 1847. They stayed in Oregon City where his mother reportedly ran a boarding house until her remarriage to Colonel James B. GRAVES, a widower from Sheridan. The family moved to Sheridan, Yamhill County, Oregon where T.R. married Elizabeth Ann PATTY and had nine children. He ran freight wagons at McCoy, Yamhill County, Oregon as well as being a farmer and rancher in both Yamhill and Marion Counties.

In the 1900 Census, T.R. and his family were living in Salem, Marion County, Oregon where he was renting a farm on Silverton Road.

In his last years he suffered greatly from cancer of the mouth and was committed for a time to The Oregon State Hospital when he attempted suicide due to the pain. He jumped off a bridge in Portland but was rescued. He was buried in the City View (Pioneer) Cemetery in the DAR circle. This circle was reserved for men who had served in the Civil War, which he had not. He had served faithfully, however, as a member in the Oregon Mounted Volunteers during the Indian Wars." 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

"Veteran of Oregon Indian Wars Tries to Commit Suicide--Penniless and Homeless, T.R. Bewley Tries to Drown Himself in River but He is Rescued---Penniless and homeless and weary of life, T.R. Bewley, a veteran of Oregon's Indian Wars, and a pioneer of 1845 (sic 1847), attempted suicide by jumping into the Willamette river at the foot of Davis street, about 5 o'clock Wednesday night. Prompt action by Grant Taylor, a night watchman employed by the Shaver Transportation company, who jumped into the river and rescued the aged veteran after he had gone down the second time, saved Bewley's life. The veteran was taken in charge by the police, taken to the police station and put to bed in the city emergency hospital. Bewley came to Oregon when 13 years old, traveling across the plains by ox team with his parents. He settled in Yamhill County, and for a number of years operated small sawmills in the valley. He served throughout the Indian campaign as a member of infantry, and is drawing a pension from the government for his services in helping make Oregon habitable for the white race. Bewley, in failing health, has been living at the Oregon Soldier's home at Roseburg for several years. He came to Portland on June 4. Since that time he has been living with Elmer Bewley, a son. He left his son's home Wednesday morning, spent his last few cents for supper in a cheap north end restaurant, went to the river to end his life." EX-SOLDIER DESPONDENT

T. R. Bewley of Roseburg While Home Attempts Suicide.

T. R. Bewley, who says he is from the Old Soldiers' Home at Roseburg, attempted to commit suicide by drowning last night, in the river at the foot of the Davis street dock. Only the prompt action of Grant Taylor, watchman for the Schaefer Transfer company, who saw the aged man leap into the river, saved his life.

He was going down the second time when Taylor jumped into the river and rescued him. Bewley was arrested and charged with disorderly conduct and given a bed in the emergency hospital until he could recover from his chilling experience.

It is believed that he is mentally unbalanced.

Phil Sheridan Days---One Town's Way To Pay Homage To Namesake With Fun

By ELAINE DAHL ROHSE Journal Special Writer

Stayton honors its beans every summer. McMimville pays tribute to its turkeys during town's Turkey-Rama. Brookings heralds its azaleas. But in Sheridan, nearly 1,900 people commemorate the memory of their town's namesake. The occasion is the annual Phil Sheridan Days celebration, which this year will be June 18 to 20.

Gen. Philip Henry Sheridan, who bears the distinction of being the fourth man to become a general in the U.S. Army, would be proud of the celebration that honors his memory.

As Ralph Matlack — owner of Matlack's Market and general chairman of the 1971 Phil Sheridan Days observance — points out, this has become a well known celebration. One of the highlights this year will be the grand parade at 6 p.m. June 19. Matlack contends this is the second largest parade in the state, playing second fiddle only to the Portland Rose Festival.

Matlack estimates that the parade will include 10 bands, 20 floats, queen's courts from all over the state, drill teams, and "horses — both individuals and groups of mounted horsemen — until there's no tomorrow."

THIS YEAR'S Phil Sheridan Days' agenda will include a program the pioneers wouldn't have believed. An AAU boxing tournament will be staged Thursday night. A carnival will be in town all week, Friday activities include a "Custom Off the Road Vehicle" show

Lillian has seen practically every one of the Phil Sheridan observances since the first celebration in 1934. Her mother, Jessie, reigned as Pioneer Queen at the 1938 fete.

A yellowed 1938 Mc-Minnville Telephone Register newspaper clipping in Lillian's possession relates: "The full day's celebration was highlighted by the coronation of Queen Jessie Bewley, 70-year-old pioneer and her court of pioneer princesses." year. In 1938, "Festivities opened Saturday morning with a traditional pioneer parade led by Milton Potter, Yamhill County oldster, costumed as the great general and astride a spirited horse."

IT'S EASY to understand why Lillian's mother, Jessie, was chosen pioneer queen. The hills to the north of Sheridan are known as the Bewley hills, and the Bewley name long has been familiar in Oregon. At least one of the Bewleys died in the October, 1847, Whitman massacre. Another of Lillian's forebears, Lorinda Bewley, who was at the mission during the massacre, was taken by the Indians; Umatilla Chief Five Crows wanted to marry her, She was ransomed by Peter Skene Ogden in December, 1847.

One of the old legends of the Sheridan area involves Lillian's father's uncle, James Bewley. In 1888, a smallpox epidemic in Mc-Minnville resulted in the McMinnville area being quarantined. James Bewley stopped to visit a Sheridan man before returning to his farm. A young marshal ordered Bewley to throw up his arms. No sooner had he done so than he was fatally shot by the marshal. A Portland paper, dated Sept. 26, 1888, stated he had been a carrier of smallpox and had been warned to leave but refused.

Max Graves, a native Sheridanite, has pictorial proof of the incident. A picture post card shows the body of James Bewley in a wooden box covered with a canvas on a wagon cart. The

ANOTHER of Lillian's souvenirs is a pass given to her father in the early 1900s. Lillian recalls Sheridan was the end of the railroad; however, two early-day doctors, Dr. Tyler Smith of Sheridan, and Dr. E. E. Goucher of McMinnville, maintained a road between the valley and coastal area. Funeral processions were permitted to travel this road free, but most other persons were required to pay a toll. Lillian still has the pass that was given to her father, dated Sheridan, Ore., July 12, 1904, and which reads, "Pass J. W. Bewley over our road free of all gate charges. SMITH AND GOUCHER,

It's no wonder pioneers such as these chose Philip Henry Sheridan as the namesake for their town. The 25-year-old West Point graduate who arrived at Yamhill on the Grand Ronde Indian Reservation in April, 1856, "governed" some 3,000 to 5,000 Indians from the Rogue, Klamath, Chinook, Modoc and Coquille tribes. Chinook. Uprooted from their native habitat, they were quarrel-some and unhappy, especially the Rogue tribe. persisted in killing and rebelling until they were finally subdued.

It was particularly difficult for the fishing Indians to make a home inland. As a result, in 1856, Phil Sheridan relocated the coastal tribes at Siletz and Yaquina, in the process constructing a road over almost impassable terrain from Kings Valley to Siletz. The lieutenant, however, was able to re-educate the remaining Indians to govern and police themselves. During his stay at Fort Yamhill he acquired property, erected a house and was socially active not only in the area but even at the governor's

dian woman who accompanied him to many social functions, including those at the Capitol.

SHERIDAN remained in the area for five years, but his influence has long outlived his physical presence. This year 16 members of the Sheridan High School American literature class, under the supervision of their teacher Mrs. Fern Eberhart, helped to further record that influence. A 28-page mimeographed booklet dedicated to Sheridanites and guests of the city during Phil Sheridan Days was prepared for the 1971 celebration.

The pamphlet's dedication reads in part, "It was the feeling . . . that there was need to gather together some of the rich heritage . . . a sampling of the background of our pioneers, our town, and our festival . . We humbly dedicate our labors to the brave pioneers, to their progeny."

The cover, done by class member Judy Gardner, includes a likeness of Gen. Sheridan and a quote attributed to him: "Whatever I took up, even if it were the simplest duties I tried to do it better than it had ever been done before."

MEANWHILE the curtain will hardly be drawn on the 1971 Phil Sheridan Days celebration before next year's event goes on the drawing board. Yet no elaborate organization assures this continuation. Program is continuation. Program is continuation. Program of the Sherican Chamber of Commerce. A special chamber committee plans the annual celebration despite the fact that the chamber has no paid manager or office staff.

And so the memory of General Phil is perpetuated.



Erma Bewley described how the couple met while they were both attending the old Independence High School. They graduated in 1919. She searched her memory when asked about their first date.

"We probably went to the movies at the Icythus Theater. They showed silent movies, and somebody played the piano down below the stage. Whenever the scene changed, they would play the piano to correspond to that scene."

They soon left Independence to allow Virgil to follow his mechanic and road-building trades. He helped build the Crater Lake Rim Road with horse-drawn road graders and later graduated to heavy construction tractors.

"It hasn't all been wine and roses," Erma said of the early

days of their marriage. "I remember picking up wood chips in the shed to heat the house and the time we got down to a nickel. Of course, that was when we rented a big, seven-room house for \$10 a month."


Edgar R. Bewley Well Known in Rose City Park District.

Interviewed in his home November 1986 by daughter, Stephenie Bewley Flora.

"My earliest memory of childhood was in Spokane [Washington]. I remember the house, the next door neighbor and the next door neighbor's cat that had a fit on the front porch and scared the bejesus out of me.

We had a Winton Six car. After the war I was telling dad that they still made the Winton Six but that it was a millionaires car. He said it was a millionaire's car when we owned it too at five miles to the gallon. We traded it in on a Patterson roadster.

The next place that I remember after Spokane was Portland. We were living there during the big spanish flu epidemic. Boy, people were dropping like flies. There were as high as 400 bodies stacked up in Portland and there were a steady stream of funeral processions going up Division Street. It was about a block and a half from our house. They were all dragging tin cans and stuff behind to warn people to stay away. Everybody was walking around with a face mask on but it didn't do any good.

I was in bed for 21 days with it. It was nip and tuck for dad and I. The only thing they knew was quinine and spirits of niter. Mom would take a quinine pill and put it in a prune and give it to me. Mom and dad were both down with the flu and I was out playing. All of a sudden I felt like the devil with a headache. I went in to mom and said `I don't feel good'. She just threw back the covers and said `climb in'. I don't think I got out for 21 days. Alot of people who had the flu and survived it, died afterwards from going out and overdoing. Their lungs were thin from the flu and would hemorrhage.

In the next few years we moved from Portland to Salem, where I started at Highland School, then back to Portland, back to Salem where I attended Grant and Highland Schools, to Dallas (OR) for the fifth and sixth grade and to Eureka (CA) for the seventh grade. I was back in Salem for the eighth and ninth grade at Keizer School. I went to Salem High School and graduated in 1929.

On holidays we would all get together somewhere. In those days they had alot of pie socials and stuff like that. The whole community would get together and meet in the school house or somewhere. They'd bid on each others lunch boxes sight unseen. The women would make up a

lunch box and decorate it and then the men would bid on them. Sometimes the woman would hint which box was hers to a special person and then that person could bid on her lunch and win the privilege of sharing it with her. If there were two interested parties the bidding could get pretty spirited.

We had alot of wieny roasts and bon fires too. Out at grandad's down by the timber he would build a great big bon fire and we would dance and play games around the fire. You had to make your own entertainment back then.

Whenever I was out of school or had time off, I always headed for Grandad Bartruff's farm. That was my fun. The horses were the big attraction out there. When I was twelve years old I was doing some plowing. They said, `You're too small for that', but I said, `I'll show you' and I'd go plow with my hands clear up by my ears on the handles. I'd get up at four o'clock in the morning and go down and feed the horses and be out in the field at seven o'clock riding the harrow or doing something like that.

I had an old gray outlaw horse that I rode. I rode him on and off until I was 18 years old. There was nobody else that could get in the same field with him. We bought him from Murphy who had mistreated him. He'd even shot him because beebees worked out of his hide all summer long. After he got some good treatment he wasn't mean anymore. He just wouldn't work for anybody. They'd hook him up and he'd just balk and turn around in the harness and tear things up. I could hook him up and he'd take off and work all day. I'd cultivate all day with the lines up on the stames and just talking to him. Up one row and down the other he'd go. Once in awhile he'd dope off and I'd yell at him and he'd jump back into the row. Old man Fandrich across the road thought he was such a good cultivator that he'd borrow him. He hooked him up and they cultivated everywhere but down the row. He brought him back and said `here, that horse is crazy'. He would throw off anybody that got on him except me. I would go down to the swimming hole down on the Pudding River. They'd steal each other's horses down there and ride off. No one stole him. They tried a time or two and landed on their head.

About the same time, I had a pet squirrel and a pet crow. I found the crow out in the yard injured. I patched it up and took care of it and by the time it got well I went to let it fly away but it just stayed with me. It would ride on one shoulder and the pine squirrel would be on the other and I'd get on that old outlaw horse and away we would go. One winter the pine squirrel disappeared and Grandad said that it had frozen but I think he shot it because it was eating holes in his grain sacks. I don't know what ever happened to the crow.

I took piano lessons for awhile from a Professor Sikes. He was an old German professor and all he did was insult you about how dumb you were. I finally told him to keep his piano and that was that. I also played on the church league basketball team. We won the Championship two years in a row.

Dad always had a good job but I didn't get an allowance of any kind. Everytime I asked for two bits I was given a lecture about how money didn't grow on trees. I can remember when they built that house on Winter Street. I did all the wiring and dug all the ditches so that I could have \$2.50 to enter a basketball tournament. Even then he gave it to me grudgingly.

My folks weren't real strict though. I split and carried in alot of wood. Mom said I started to answer to the name `wood' because they were always saying `wood' to me. But dad, he always let me drive his car around. I remember the old Model T of Willie Bartruff's. We were out working and they sent me home for breakfast in the old Model T. It was the first time I had driven a Model T but I made it home. Aunt Mary like to have had a cat fit, sending a kid home in a car like that. She was still horse and buggy days. We used to go over to Sheridan alot to visit Uncle Willie. We didn't have alot of conveniences that people have today but we always had a phone as far

back as I can remember. Grandad even had a phone out there at the farm. It was one of those old crank phones.

The first radio we had was out at Chemawa. As a matter of fact, it was only about the second radio in that area. It was a battery operated Etwater-Kent Super Hetrodine radio. Dad bought a wet battery with a bunch of glass cells and a deal to plug in to charge it. We kept it charged. It had an A and B battery. I had that in Montana and when I left there I left the radio right there in the room and that was the end of that.

We listened to the Hoot Owls and the Orchestras on the radio. Before we got a regular radio and before anyone in the area had a radio, I built a crystal set with Babe and Ira Turner. It had earphones and we would listen to Nashville Tennessee every night until 3:30 in the mornings sometimes. It would come in as clear as could be.

The only other entertainment we had were the old silent movies but you had to read everything on the screen. The first 'talkie' I remember was at the Elsinore. We used to drive up to Portland to the Broadway sometimes and watch vaudeville. And the old Liberty theater here in Salem had stuff like boxing, kangaroos, bears to wrestle and bucking horses to ride. I tried them all.

The clothes we wore in High School were about the same as you see on alot of kids now except in my Senior year, white cords were the thing. Nobody was allowed to wear them unless they were a Senior and the dirtier the cords were, the better. In fact, we'd take a brand new pair of white cords and rub dirt in them before we'd wear them.

There wasn't much unusual about our life. I do remember a dust storm that we had here. It blew in out of Eastern Oregon and turned day into night for about three days. And I remember when the State Capitol burned. Old Ray Bedwell and I dashed in there to watch it. It was quite a fire. That copper dome at the top burned green. It was really something to see. I also remember the Willamette River froze over and we walked across it.

Ferry Street downtown [Salem] used to be China Town but they all moved down to San Francisco. The Japanese had a settlement down around High Street but World War II wiped them out because they were all bundled off to detention camps. Lake Labish was all Japanese too because they had a 99 year lease on the lake out there which became void due to the war.

When I graduated from Salem High School in 1929 I didn't even wait for the graduation ceremonies. I got out on Friday and left on Saturday so that I could go to work in Montana on Monday.

After work closed up in Montana in the winter of 1929 I came back and went to work in the woods with Uncle Andy Bunch, aunt Margaret's [Bartruff] husband. He was a woods boss. I was there about a week with snow about 8 feet deep. I was carrying pipe from one place to another, walking down a log with pipes on my shoulder. My feet slipped and I slid down that log on my butt for about 20 feet. I got up and said `I'm too smart for this job'. I started for camp down the highline in mud about 10 inches deep.

My feet couldn't keep up with the rest of me and I took a head dive in that mud, lost my dinner bucket and was mud from head to foot. When I got within hollerin' distance of camp I told my uncle to `make out my check, I'll be there in a minute'. I went back to Montana. I worked there as a fire guard for the Indian Forest Service. I hauled supplies all over the reservation and whenever they had a fire I was on the fire line. I made \$3.75 and a house.

When I cam back from Montana I was visiting over at my sister's house when I met Lorraine. That was 1931. We didn't start going together until Valentines Day of 1932 and then we were married in 1933.

Through the years I've driven and owned numerous cars. That car we had on Winter Street when I was going to school was a Dodge Sedan. Of course, that was Dad's but I drove it all the

time. Then I bought my first automobile, the last four cylinder Buick made. The next car I had was a Model T pickup that I paid \$18 for. That was in 1935 when I went to work for the paving crew. That same year we bought a Model A Roadster that had been repossessed by the Buick garage for \$135. We traded that in on an Oakland Victory Six. That was the one we were in when two drunks pulled out in front of us on Fairgrounds Road and we hit them broadside and demolished their homemade Maxwell with the tongue and groove lumber for a cab. Boy, it just flew apart. One guy in there just went straight up in the air still in a sitting position and came down on the pavement on his butt. No one was seriously hurt but it was quite a sight. I traded that Victory Six in on a `36 Ford. I didn't have enough money to buy a license so it had to sit in the shed there until payday. We could go out and sit in it but we couldn't drive it. We had that until I went in the army.

We were living out at Roberts when the war broke out. We moved in to town because we could see how things were going to be. About that time I decided to enlist because I felt like I had to do my part. To begin with I took a test for the Navy ship repair units and was assigned to First Class and went to Portland and took a test for Chief Petty Officer and passed that. I was waiting for Glen Shedeck, who was having trouble passing the exam, when Bill Bihl, my brother-in-law, talked me into going into the engineers with him. The Highway Department had an agreement with the Army Engineers to refer any skilled labor or operators of equipment directly to the engineer corps. So we went in on special assignment through the Highway Department. I had orders to wire my serial

number to headquarters in Columbus, Ohio the minute I got it, which I did. We were bussed from Salem to Fort Lewis on about the Fourth of March or along there. We were there about two weeks when Bill Bihl was assigned to Oklahoma. So much for our staying together. About a week later I got my orders from Columbus, Ohio and the 9th Army Command in Utah confirming that I was assigned to the 1257th Engineer Combat Battalion in Camp Bowie, Texas. I was assigned to headquarters and service company, which is the motor pool. There were two battalion mechanics and I was one of them. The other four companies had company mechanics.

I was there until around the first of June when the CO gave me a chance to go to school at Fort Crook, Nebraska, which I accepted. I got out of alot of tough basic training besides a chance to go to school. I was signed up for the wrong course, or so the instructors told me. I should have been in the advanced course but they gave me alot of good instruction on the side so I got alot of good out of it, especially on electrical, carburetors and diesel engines.

After June, July and August at school I came home to Salem on a 10 day delay enroute and then went back to Fort Crook and on to Camp Bowie, Texas again. We were there repairing equipment for overseas and getting ready for shipping out when along in October we boarded a troop train and wandered around twelve states on our way to New York and back down to Camp Kilmar, New Jersey, where we boarded an English ship. It was a 400 foot diesel, one of the biggest diesels afloat. We headed for Europe. To beat the submarine pack we went down the East coast, within three miles of the Equator, and across to Africa, and up the coast to England from there. We landed at Plymouth, England and bussed up to a little town called Exeter, in Debon County, where we collected some more equipment and toured around England looking things over.

We were there until New Years Eve, when we boarded an LST from Southampton, England and crossed the English Channel into France. We landed there New Years Eve in the snow and cold. The night was spent wrapped in a blanket, sitting there in an open three quarter ton, trying to keep warm. The next day we went on to a little place called Forges-Les-Eaux, where there was about eight inches of snow. The troops were in pup tents but the motor pool had a little barn. We were

in the loft with a pot belly stove so we didn't do too bad. We spent our time there gathering more equipment from Brussels, Belgium and around. I was hauling ammunition from Swissel and France up to the front until they got more equipment and drivers.

The line company was clearing out mines from Omaha Beach and a little town called Fecamp and the surrounding country. From there we were on the alert a half a dozen times for reserve troops for the Battle of the Bulge. We would load up, then they would call off, and we would unload. Then we'd load up and they'd call it off again. Finally, they decided they didn't need us so we went above, North of the Rouen, to a big field where we built a Camp Lucky Strike as a kind of a reassignment center for inductees coming in from the states as replacements. We were there for a month, maybe, and then moved on to a place called Maria Loch. It was just a big lake with an orchard around it with meadows. We camped out there. Up above us on a hill was a big hundred year old

monastery. We were there working over our equipment until we finally left there and traveled around the country. France and Germany and all of them were just like being in Oregon, as far as I could see. France was nice open country with timber. Their timber was replanted, though, and it was growing in rows like orchards.

Traveling through the Argon Forest I could see the World War I trenches still there and artillery pieces sitting around rusting away. Nobody had ever cleaned them up from World War I. We went through the Black Forest where there were second growth trees growing just as thick as hair on a dog, until it looked black.

Germany had asphalt roads with timber and hills and open farmland. It was just like traveling around through Western Oregon. It was pretty country. We traveled around and went through a castle at Cologne (Koln), Germany, where we stayed awhile. There were about 300 prisoners in a stockade there that we were guarding. We moved around to two or three locations and finally we were assigned to third Army for Aurora crossing for Bailey Bridge work. We got there and they didn't need us and loaned us to the Ninth Army who, by the time we got to them in Belgium, didn't need us either. They sent us up to Holland to the British Second Army and the Canadian First Army, taking orders from


American Combat Group. We were special troops like that all through the war, never assigned to any division, only bandied around to whoever needed extras. We got to travel alot of country that way. At one time or another I belonged to every Army in Europe except the Fifth Army. I belonged to the 36th Division and the First and Third Army, the Seventh Army, the Twelfth Army, the Fifteenth Army and the 23rd Corps at different times. From Holland, we spent our time building and repairing roads up to the front lines for ambulances and ammo wagons traveling back and forth. The Colonel made me a special traveling inspector to travel around to our three different line companies and inspect their equipment to make sure they were taking care of it to suit the old Colonel. These unites were about twenty miles apart doing road work. In the meantime, he was scavengering up an old steam engine that he had me build into a shower and hot water heater as well as an asphalt plant and rock crusher that we set up to help our road work.

After we left Holland, we went back to Belgium and Germany again. We landed in Germany in a little town called Donn, where we were with Patton's outfit. He was traveling so fast that they just called us off and we sat there repairing our equipment and waited for further orders. About that time, the war ended and we moved from there to over on the Rhine River and two or three locations around a town called Neweid and Erlish and from there up into a big field near a place called Obermorlen. It was just flat, open country with lots of grass and shrubs. It looked like central Oregon. From there we started breaking up our outfit. I stayed overnight with a group in a stockade with barbed wire all around. It had been an American Stockade. From there I went to a

forestry company in Zuchien, Germany in a castle. It had belonged to an old Baron. They had kicked him out and took it over for a barracks. I was the only one in the motor pool who had moved in there on points average. I was stuck for the whole motor pool, cleaning up their excess equipment and getting rid of the stuff. I had quite a time getting rid of the extra trucks and equipment.

From there I went down to Bulvaria in Southern Germany to the 36th Division to ship home. It was around November and they were supposed to guarantee everybody there that they'd be home by Christmas. About that time they had a bottleneck in the port and cleaned out a regiment. I was sent back up to Weinheim, Germany and a railroad switch yard with a sausage factory and a farm implement building that we used for a motor pool and barracks. I had a room in an office in the farm implement building.

There I stayed, working on and processing equipment for occupation forces. I sorted it out, stacked the good stuff and junked the bad stuff. It was an ordinance outfit--the 84th Division. I came home with them on the 30th of December. We shipped out to LeHarve, France, where we processed and waited for about nine days to come home. On the 8th of January, we boarded a 7000 ton ship that built as a passenger liner for the New York to Puerto Rico run. It was turned into a troop ship. It was a pretty small boat for overseas. We came home by the North Atlantic. We hit storms the first night out and it stormed all the way home. About 800 miles from France on my 35th birthday they had the worst storm to hit the North Atlantic in history, according to the old stewards that had been shipping out for years and some of the old sailors."



"BEWLEY, John M., County Surveyor and Justice of the Peace, Colville, Wash., was born in VanBuren County, Mo., June 10th, 1845. He was the son of John W. and Catherine B. (ELLIS) BEWLEY. Going with his parents to Willamette Valley, Or., his eldest brother was mercilessly killed in the horrible massacre by the Indians at the mission in Whitman County, Wash.; his sister was captured at the same time and dreadfully treated until her release upon the savages being obliged to give up their captives. Young BEWLEY was educated at the Willamette University, at Salem, Oregon., taking the full course and graduating in 1866. Moving to California, he taught school in various localities until 1868. Returning to Oregon, he was married there in 1870. He engaged at Independence, Polk County, Oregon., in the practice of dentistry for some years. Wholesale grain-selling occupied him from 1876-80, when he removed to Washington Territory, locating at Walla Walla; from thence to Spokane in 1881. From 1881-82 he assisted Contractor D.W. SMALL on the Northern Pacific Railroad. He came to Colville in 1883 and took up a homestead claim, which he subsequently sold at a profit. In 1884 he was elected Justice of the Peace at Colville, an office which he continues to fill with marked efficiency. Since 1885 he had been the County Surveyor of Stevens County." [History of Washington, p498]

"John M. Bewley is a pioneer, not only of Ferry county but also of Stevens county when the first named division was a part of Stevens county. He is well and favorably known in Republic, where he makes his home at the present time, and has a wide acquaintance in Oregon.

John M. Bewley was born in Cass County, Missouri, on January 10, 1845, the son of John W. and Katherine B. (Ellis) Bewley, natives of Indiana and Tennessee, respectively. In 1847, he crossed the plains with ox teams to Oregon, locating in Oregon City. The father died soon after arriving, and our subject's brother, Crockett W., was killed in theWhitman massacre. His sister was taken prisoner in the same conflict but was rescued three weeks later by volunteers. After this, the mother settled in Yamhill County, remaining until 1864, then removed to Salem, where she died in 1867. The brothers and sisters of our subject are named as follows, C.W., Lorinda E., James F., Linura J., Maranda, Theopolus R., Henry and John. Mr. Bewley had an uncle, Rev. Anthony Bewley, who was hung by the rebels in 1864, because of his allegiance to the Union. Our subject received his early education in Yamhill County, Oregon, then graduated from Willamette University in 1866. Following this he practiced dentistry for ten years. Desiring more freedom in life, he went into the stock business, and later took up

buying and selling grain. In 1883 he came to Colville and took up surveying, which he had studied during the earlier part of his life. For nine years he was surveyor of Stevens county. In 1896 he located where Republic now is and located numerous mining claims. Later he patented the ground now in Mono Addition to Republic, and owns a great portion of it. He also has property in Spokane and other places. Mr. Bewley has been surveyor of Ferry county for four years, and has also been justice of the peace for four years.

Politically, he is a Republican, and very active in the campaigns. In 1870 Mr. Bewley married Miss Maggie E. Dawson, whose parents were natives of Scotland and Kentucky, respectively and crossed the plains in 1845 to McMinnville, Oregon. They were the parents of ten children. Our subject and his wife have four children; Frank W., in republic; Claude, in Spokane; Bernal, in Sanden, British Columbia; and Maude, married to William Page in Republic." [History of North Washington; Published 1904]

"March 11 the initial meeting of the Ferry county commissioners was held at Republic. H. L. Percy, D. W. Yeargin and L. P. Wilmot constituted the board appointed by Governor Rogers. H. L. Percy was elected chairman, and for a temporary clerk, S. I. Spiggle was chosen. Mr. Spiggle was also appointed the first auditor of the new county. Other officials named by the commissioners at subsequent meetings were: George A. Graham, county superintendent of schools; J. M. BEWLEY, justice of the peace; W. C. Morris, acting prosecuting attorney; Henry Waisman, sheriff; L. H. Mason, treasurer; J. W. Griswold, deputy sheriff; Merton E. Jesseph, county clerk; R. B. Thomas, surveyor." 





Mr. Bristol quietly married Miss Edith L. Bewley and they slipped out of Portland on their honeymoon lecture.






