Kalapuyan Relics

from "The Kalapuyans" by Harold Mackey, Ph.D.

The Pudding River Kalapuyans, (Ahantchuyuk)* lived in the central Willamette Valley east of the Willamette River before the arrival of white immigrants. These Indians disappeared to disease and reservations. But they left evidence of their occupation in the form of stone and sometimes bone tools.

Many have been found while farming. Many farm houses display a hanging frame of these relics, or a least have a few in a drawer.

One day while pulling onions on the Hayes Lake Labish property, my mother found a beautiful blue and white stone knife.

When my grandfather, George McIlwain cleared new farming acreage, he and his family found many broken and a few stone utensils. He lined his driveway with mortars and pestles.

After years of working the land, the discovery of relics lessened. Occasionally, one was found while doing farm work. As a kid on the farm, I would hunt the plowed fields after rains had settled the dirt, and find a few, (mostly pieces). Today, farming can go from plowing to planting in a few days. So relic hunting isn't the same as when I was a kid.

Many of these stone tools were made of material not readily available in the mid-valley. Mortars and pestles were usually a lava basaltic rock, which could be obtained in the hills. Knives, spear points and arrowheads were fashioned from chert, flint, jasper or agate, much of which could be found in far river gravels. Some of the cutting artifacts were made of obsidian, which to me suggest trade with eastern Oregon Indians.
