The French Prairie Heritage Rose Garden -

Only stopping and literally "smelling the roses" can really bring to life the many interesting details in this garden of about 40 roses near the entrance of Powerland Heritage Park. This article summarizes two of the six of collections in the garden and relates a few of the many interesting stories the roses hold.



The *Mary Drain Albro Rose Collection* is part of the *Oregon Heritage Rose Collection.* Mary Drain Albro (1876 – 1962) was a pioneer descendent and rose historian who believed old roses have an important story to tell. She recorded first and secondhand oral accounts on her rose finding adventures between 1936 and 1942, when her Pioneer Rose Association was an active organization. Two of the roses in this collection are described below.

Witness Rose To your left as you enter is an unusual rose with a "green eye" that grew on the Douglas County home place of General Joseph Lane who was commissioned first Governor of Oregon Territory in 1948. Mary Albro named this rose the "Witness Rose" because, in another location, an escalating property line dispute was settled when an old-timer recalled the rose had been planted along a property boundary.

Apothecary's Rose To your right as you enter. This ancient rose (before 1160) was known by many names including Red Rose of Lancaster, Provins Rose and Old Red Damask. The Exhibition name is R. gallica officinalis. Mary Albro associated the rose with Jesse and Cynthia Applegate and it is planted at Pioneer Mothers Cabin in Champoeg

French Prairie Pioneer Rose Collec-

tion reflects unique local history and honors pioneering families by exhibiting roses with historic ties to the community. Each rose has a story, and here are two of them.

The Mary Ann Egan Rose– Mary Ann Egan crossed the Oregon Trail in 1852 at the age of 8 with her parents, Patrick Egan and his wife Catherine Canty. Six years later, at age fourteen, Mary Ann died of pneumonia.

A white moss rose was planted on her grave in the St. Louis Cemetery where it thrived for 100 years, before it was moved to the Egan Century Farm near Brooks. Mary Ann's niece, Adele Egan, saved the rose almost sixty years ago, by moving it to her family's 1875 farm where it continues to bloom year after year in memory of little Mary Ann.

This once-blooming, tall arching shrub is covered with thick, mossy, blush-pink buds that open to beautiful snow-white roses.

"Hanson Stevens. age 37, and his wife Lavina, age 33, along with their seven children, left their home in Keokuk, Iowa, and made the arduous six-month journey on



the Oregon trail in 1852. They settled in the Silverton/Mt. Angel area along the Pudding River on a 308-acre donation land claim. One of the few prized items surviving the journey was a slip of a rose that Lavina loved. The rose was purportedly transported in a potato to provide moisture and protection during the trip. Once in Oregon, Lavina nurtured the rose. At some point after Lavina's death in 1859, a clipping was planted at her grave. Over time the rose in the graveyard was the only remaining offspring of the original. Previously unnamed, it was christened the Bethany Rose, after the cemetery where Lavina and Hanson are buried. Clippings of this, a hardy and resilient plant, have been distributed to every branch of the family, with the original bush left in Bethany Cemetery to continue growing alongside the grave of its beloved owner."

The French Prairie Heritage Rose Garden was created as a cooperative effort between Northwest Rose Historians, Brooks Historical Society, and Antique Powerland Museum Association.

Ownership of the garden now rests with the Antique Powerland Museum Association. Thanks to dedicated volunteers such as Dorene Standish, Judy Hall, Tom and Patty Brock, the Boy Scouts, Mark Bennett and his APMA crew, and others the rose garden is maintained. It is a big job!
